ASHLAND CITIZEN DISAPPEARS, FOUR PLAY IS SUSPECTED

ASHLAND, July 22.—(Special.) The disappearance of Vern Bartram, an aged man from his home Saturday night is causing his friends considerable anxiety. Mr. Bartram is 62 years of age, 5 feet 11 inches in height, and weighs about 190 pounds. When he disappeared he wore a gray hat, gray work shirt and overalls. He is slightly stooped, very deaf and somewhat bald. Several teeth in front and on the left side are gold. He suffered a stroke of paralysis several weeks ago but had recovered sufficiently to visit down town. He left home Saturday morning for a visit in the business section and no trace has been found of him since. Information was given yesterday concerning Bartram's disappearance to Chief of Police McNabb by J. W. Halfhill, with whom he was living. Anyone having information concerning his whereabouts is asked to get in touch with either Chief McNabb or Mr. Halfhill. Friends fear for his safety.
