

SCOPES DEFENSE GETS BUSY ON MONKEY APPEAL

DAYTON, Tenn., July 22.—(A. P.)—Close of the Scopes case brought only extra work for John R. Neal, chief counsel for the defense. His was the task of preparing the record of the conviction of the 24-year-old school teacher on a charge of teaching evolution theories in the public schools, for submission to the supreme court. As he began his work today, he estimated that one week would be required in getting the document ready for the printer.

With Scopes convicted and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 the scene shifted from Dayton to Knoxville, where the supreme court hears cases from that Tennessee town in September. The Tennessee supreme court meets in Knoxville, Nashville and Jackson and failure to be heard on the evolution issue in September would result in a delay of one year.

Lawyers yesterday suggested a bare possibility that the case might have to go to an appellate court before reaching the supreme court, under an act of the last legislature expanding the power of the court of appeals to hear certain cases formerly considered by the supreme court. It was considered unlikely, however, that the Scopes case would be sidetracked before reaching the state's highest tribunal.

In connection with the perfection of the appeal it was pointed out that a new line of lawyers may be found when the case is heard in Knoxville.

John R. Neal, a senior counsel, was expected to represent the defense, but his associates may not be those who appeared in the trial court. Bainbridge Colby, formerly secretary of state and active figure in the case before the trial at Dayton, was not present here but his associates pointed out that he had not withdrawn and was a member of the defense counsel. Asked if Mr. Colby would make an argument before the supreme court, Neal said that while he was not prepared to announce who would speak for the de-

GERMAN REPLY PLEASES PARIS, AGREEMENT SEEN

PARIS, July 21.—(A. P.)—Germany has replied in a conciliatory manner to the allied observations concerning her suggestion for a security pact guaranteeing her western frontiers, and it is agreed, with but few exceptions, that the German communication while far from removing all the obstacles to a settlement of the security problems, opens the way for negotiations from which an understanding may emerge. Meanwhile, the evacuation of the Ruhr region by the French and Belgian forces of occupation is going on apace the belief being expressed that by July 31, virtually all of the allied troops will have left the Ruhr in fulfillment of the promise made by the French government that France would evacuate the Ruhr within a year after the Dawes plan became effective.

MUD ERUPTION ON MT. SHASTA AGAIN

REDDING, Cal., July 22.—(A. P.) A flow of ashes and mud originating approximately 8000 feet up the side of Mount Shasta, is causing the waters of the Sacramento and the McCloud rivers to run muddy in this region. Mud creek at McCloud, which was filled by a glacial flow from the mountain last year is again a torrent of thick liquid mud.

The McCloud River railroad is raising its tracks three feet for a distance of 6000 feet to prevent a blockade from the mud.

Last year's flow came from a height of 10000 feet.
