Man Involved in Klamath Murder Is Held, Liquor Charge

PORTLAND, Ore., July 23.—Johnny O'Shea, arrested at Klamath Falls last night is charged with conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition law and with manufacture of liquor. Assistant United States District Attorney McGilchrist said the alleged offense was committed in Klamath county, west of Klamath Falls.

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., July 23.—O'Shea was arrested here last night by a deputy United States marshal and later released on \$1000 bonds. With three others he was arrested early last January charged with the murder of Oscar Erickson in a gambling house slaying. He was the only one of the four men to win an acquittal. He has extensive sheep interests in this section.

MEDFORD MAYOR TO MEET TEMPLAR TRAIN IN ASHLAND
