

### CITY PREPARING FOR RECEPTION OF TEMPLAR VISITORS

The drill team of Oakland, Calif., commandery, Knights Templars drill corps and band, on Main street tomorrow evening will undoubtedly attract an unusually large crowd of Medford and valley people. This commandery is en route to the national Knights Templars' convocation at Seattle, and will stop off here for an hour, arriving at 6:45 p. m., during which the maneuvers will take place on Main street between Front and Oakdale streets, which space will be roped off from all auto and other street traffic.

That section of Main street will be roped off at 6 p. m., and auto owners will govern themselves accordingly. The auto congestion in the business section is expected to be heavy.

The actual drill maneuvers will take place in front of the city park, although the drill squad and band will parade between Front and Oakdale streets.

The local Knights Templars will decorate the chamber of commerce rooms tomorrow with flowers and potted plants in honor of the visitors, who will make their headquarters there during their hour's stay.

In addition, in connection with the many Knights Templar commanderies passing through Medford, en route to and from the convocation, the local chamber of commerce will place two big framed cloth signs on its building, bearing the words in large letters, "Welcome, Knights Templars." The largest sign, 12 by 3 feet will be placed on the west side of the building, and the smaller sign, 8 by 3 feet, will grace the Main street front of the building. The signs will be up for a week.

### HELEN WILLS IS EASY WINNER IN WOMEN'S FINALS

MANCHESTER, Mass., July 24.—(A. P.)—Miss Helen Wills of Berkeley, Cal., national women's champion, decisively defeated Miss Mary K. Browne, of Santa Monica, Cal., second ranking player in the United States in the finals of the women's invitation singles tournament at the Essex County Country club here today. The scores were 6-2, 6-1.

Miss Wills, closing the second tournament in which she has appeared in the east this season, proved that she is still the queen of the American courts. Her superior pace, steadiness and tactics were too much for her opponent. The champion's force and speed kept her on the offense and she wasted no time in taking the match in straight sets.

Miss Browne kept the ball in play much more than seemed possible in the face of Miss Wills' fierce attack. As a result the match included many remarkably long rallies which usually ended in victory for the champion.

### MODERNIST D. D. CLEARED, ENEMIES ARE CONDEMNED

WAUPACA, Ill., July 24.—(A. P.)—Dr. George E. Hunt, pastor of Christ Presbyterian church, Madison, Wis., today stood clear of all charges of heresy placed against him by a group of clergymen of the Madison presbytery, following the sustaining of a report made by a committee of ministers and laymen to the synod of Wisconsin, in session here. The committee report sustained the findings of the Madison presbytery which cleared Dr. Hunt of heresy charges last November. The synod immediately adopted the committee report, which censured the Madison group of clergymen for bringing the charges against Dr. Hunt on what it termed insufficient evidence.

Charges on which Dr. Hunt was freed include: Affirmation by him of evolution, with a declaration that life developed on earth long before appearance of man; statement that Genesis is a crude yet noble conception of God, as the creator, and signature of Dr. Hunt to a petition asking support of Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick in his religious views.

**John Connelly Hanged**  
FOLSOM PRISON, Cal., July 24.—(A. P.) John Connelly, alias "Silver Joe" Kelly, was hanged here today for the murder in Marysville in February 12, 1923, of Policeman Francis M. Hennan. Connelly made no statement. He walked to the scaffold unassisted.
