

# GOV. PIERCE TO RUN AGAIN IS SALEM REPORT

SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Declaration of friends of Sam Garland of Lebanon, state senator from Linn county, that he would announce his candidacy for the democratic nomination for United States senator in Portland today shared honors with the retirement of L. L. Patterson yesterday from the position as chairman of the republican state central committee as a topic for speculation among the political prognosticators around the state capital today.

The announcement concerning Garland's candidacy was generally construed as tantamount to a declaration by Governor Pierce that he would remain out of the senatorial contest and seek reelection to his present office, considering the close political and personal fellowship existing between the governor and Garland.

Patterson's retirement from the party organization is generally interpreted as the opening gun in his campaign for the republican gubernatorial nomination, and is being contrasted with the announcement made here last Saturday night by Charles Hall of Marshfield, also mentioned as an aspirant for the republican gubernatorial nomination, that he has not authorized any announcement of his candidacy.

Prospects of a three cornered race for the republican nomination for governor are contained in the position taken by Sam Koser, secretary of state, who has let it be known through friends that he is "not adverse to being mentioned as a possible candidate."

Garland's pronouncement has put to rest the local talk of ex-Governor Oswald West being a candidate for the democratic nomination for United States senator in the event that Governor Pierce should decide to seek that honor.

# VICE-PRESIDENT PLAYS IN MOVIE IN 4 GALLON HAT

CHEYENNE, Wyo., July 24.—(A. P.)—Vice-President Charles G. Dawes extended the range of his versatility this morning when he directed the filming of a scene of a western motion picture at Julesburg, Wyo., four miles from Cheyenne. The vice-president, coached by James Cruz and with an occasional pointer from Betty Compton, appeared to enjoy the novel role which he assumed.

Mrs. Dawes, accompanied by United States Senator Francis E. Warren, Mrs. Warren and a committee of prominent local folk, left for the Julesburg location at 8 o'clock. Surrounded by a throng of Sioux Indians in war paint and gaudy, bearded actors in the picturesque garb characteristic of the west two-thirds of a century ago, and actresses in the light bodices and voluminous skirts which were au fait in the 60's, they inspected the movie village—a reproduction of Julesburg, Colo., as it was in the days of the pony express, which is deemed to go up in smoke next week when it will be "attacked" and fired by Indians.

Vice President Dawes probably will have to ship to Washington by express the "four-gallon" hats which will be presented him when he is here: Last night the American Legion presented him with one which he wore at a rakish angle while taking a ride in an ancient stage coach. This morning he wore another presented by Betty Compton—a pure white masterpiece of the hat maker's art, with a brim 18 inches wide and a crown eight inches high.

On his return from the "movie lot" the vice-president reviewed the frontier days parade, a colorful procession in which the cavalry and artillery sarrison of Fort Russell, nearly 400 Indians and hundreds of cowboys and cowgirls participated.

# GOVERNOR CANCELS EXTRADITION, MAN IS GIVEN LIBERTY

SALEM, Ore., July 24.—Grant of extradition which yesterday authorized the return to Los Angeles of Harry Van Gilder to face charges of embezzlement was today recalled by Governor Pierce after information had been received from California authorities that the criminal charge against Van Gilder was an attempt on the part of a Los Angeles brokerage firm to secure by intimidation settlement of a disputed debt.

Shortly after, Judge L. H. McMahan of the Marion county circuit court, granted a petition for a writ of habeas corpus and Van Gilder was dismissed a free man.

The charge that Van Gilder's prosecutors were attempting to press criminal charges for a purely civil dispute was made at the extradition hearing yesterday, but was contradicted by telegraphic advices from Los Angeles authorities addressed to the governor asking that he disregard any such claim.

Van Gilder was arrested in Salem several weeks ago by local police while in company with a motor party of three others. His companions were released the day following the arrest.

# SAILOR CONFESSES TO KILLING MAN

SALEM, Ore., July 24.—By posting \$65,000 in bonds railroad companies operating in the state have been granted a stay in circuit court here of the decree denying an injunction against the public service commission to restrain it from enforcing a fifteen per cent freight rate cut on intrastate rates covering grain, grain products, potatoes and onions.

The O. W. R. and N. and affiliated roads posted a \$25,000 bond, the Southern Pacific a \$25,000 bond, the Spokane, Portland and Seattle and affiliated roads a \$10,000 bond and the Portland Electric Power company and Willamette Valley Southern a \$5000 bond.

Under the bonds the railroad companies agree to rebate any overcharges if the higher courts sustain the commission.

# RAILROADS POST BONDS, RATE CUT HERE IS HELD UP

Although Africa is becoming modernized the greater part of the task of bringing Christianity to the dark people lies in the future. Barbarous tribes, many of whom have never seen the face of a white man, rule the interior, and according to Doctor Dye,

# LIGHTNING HITS HOUSE VIA RADIO, ARRESTERS LACKING

BEND, Ore., July 24.—Radio fans of Bend alarmed on hearing reports that a lightning bolt had run down a radio wire and set fire to the home of B. C. Crane, this city, during the storm of yesterday, were today relieved to learn that the damage was caused by an incomplete radio apparatus.

Experts today stated that investigation of the apparatus at the Crane home showed there was no arrester connected with the wiring, and the set had been removed. The bolt which struck one of two trees on which the antenna was strung, jumped the insulator, ran to the house, and, there being no further wiring, short circuited, setting the house on fire.

Ralph Hope, radio expert and inspector of an electrical supply house here who inspected, found the insulator wire broken and partly burned through. He said had arresters been connected with the apparatus the house would not have caught fire.
