

LE PATTERSON RESIGNS JOB TO RUN FOR GOVERNOR

PORTLAND, Ore., July 24.—(A. P.)—L. L. Patterson, former state senator, late yesterday resigned as chairman of the republican state central committee, and his friends announced this was a step preliminary to launching his candidacy for the republican nomination for governor. In a letter to Phil Metschan, treasurer of the committee, Patterson said that he had resigned from the committee and through the press I am glad that there is more or less of my name as a prospective candidate for governor in the approaching primary nominating election. In view of the fact that I have this matter under consideration, I feel that I should no longer continue as chairman of the republican state central committee.

MILLIONAIRE AND WIFE ARE SUED

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., July 24.—(A. P.)—Frank D. Brown, vice president of the General Motors corporation, and his wife, Greta Brown of Sag-On-Hudson, are co-defendants in a suit for \$75,000 brought by Miss Maloney, former domestic in the Brown home, for alleged assault, and false arrest. The case was disclosed today when defense attorneys asked Chief Justice Tompkins of the Westchester county court to have the three actions separated. Justice reserved decision. Miss Maloney alleges that when she was valued at \$10,000 were stolen from the Brown home in September, she was forced into a room by Browns and held until a private detective arrived and questioned her.

CONFERENCE MAY PREVENT STRIKE IN BRITISH MINES

LONDON, July 24.—(A. P.)—Late this afternoon it was announced that representatives of British coal miners and operators would meet in a joint conference, July 29. This is the first successful move toward averting the threatening British coal strike. The announcement followed conferences with W. C. Bridgeman, first lord of the admiralty, as mediator, had separately with the workers and mine owners. The miners' federation has announced a strike to take effect July 31, when the present working agreement with the owners expires. Every effort is being made to bring the two sides together, but the miners had previously refused to meet the owners unless the latter withdrew their proposed new agreement providing for reduced wages and substitution of an eight hour day for the present seven hour working period.

SARGENT PICTURES SELL AT RATE OF \$1000 A MINUTE

LONDON, July 24.—(A. P.)—High prices were bid today at the opening of an auction of 240 paintings by John Singer Sargent, the celebrated American artist who died in April in London, where he had lived for many years. Speculators and collectors besieged the auction rooms. Within the first half hour the bids averaged the approximate equivalent of \$1,000 per minute. A small drawing of a scene in Carrara, Italy, went for one thousand guineas or about \$5,000. A Venetian scene sold for twice that sum. As the sale progressed, the bidding became higher and higher and within the first hour a diminutive painting of a canal scene in Venice brought 4600 guineas, or about \$23,000. Seventy-eight Sargent drawings sold for 53,000 pounds, or roughly \$267,000. A small picture of the Doge's palace at Venice brought \$2300 guineas, or about \$11,000. The first day's sale realized a total of 145,084 pounds (about \$730,000.)
