REDDY HOUSE IS BROKEN INTO AND FURNITURE TAKEN

The Johnson Produce Meat Market on North Fir was burglarized last night and a residence owned by Mrs. J. F. Reddy at 810 Oakdale broken into some time previous, \$250 worth of property being taken. H. Mitchell, proprietor of the meat market, reports a loss of over \$30 in supplies, such as butter, canned goods, fruit extracts and damage done to 100 pounds of fish by auto polish and liniment, which was poured over them by the miscreants. Entrance was made by a side window by ripping off the screen as it has been left open for proper ventilation. As the window is quite high, it is believed that at least two men were needed to make the entrance. When inside they drank two bottles of fruit sprang, used for soft drinks, ate the contents of two jars of fruit, spoiled the fish by the auto polish, and then ransacked the office and left, taking with them supplies of a varied nature. The robbery was not discovered until this morning when Mitchell opened the shop, at which time the police were promptly notified, and who at the present time are searching for two white men and a negro boy as suspects. The three, according to late reports, were in the vicinity of Gold Hill, where officers are searching to apprehend them. Sometime during the past ten days, Mrs. J. F. Reddy reports, her residence at 810 Oakdale was entered and furnishings taken. She discovered the theft Thursday afternoon while there inspecting her property with the intention of occupying it. Entrance was made through the back door, which was still open when she made the discovery. Every piece of furniture in the house was stolen, which included a small cook stove, a green stairway rug, 15x3 1/2 feet with red border, an upholstered chair with blue silk cloth, another upholstered chair with linen cloth, a mahogany arm chair with one arm broken, kitchen linoleum and one old oak rocker. No clues were left behind, but the local police are working upon the case with progress reported. Mrs. Reddy is offering a substantial reward for any information leading to the recovery of the stolen furniture.

3 FOREST FIRES IN CRATER PARK NOW CONTROLLED

Three forest fires were reported to the Crater National Forest office yesterday, two of which were on state land and one in the national forest, with the cause of each given as lightning. The most serious of the three was a 50-acre blaze near Spriggett Butte, about 25 miles east of Medford. Four men, under District Fire Warden P. B. Lowd, brought the fire under control after several hours fighting yesterday afternoon. The location was quite close to an old burn, which was the result of a 100 acre fire several weeks ago. The damage, according to Mr. Lowd, was small, but could have been much greater had it not been promptly put under control, as the fire was in thick timber. The two small lightning fires, one near Antelope creek on state land, and the other near Goosenest in the Crater National Forest about 30 miles from Medford, are not serious, according to late reports received at the forest service office, and are now being brought under control.

MAYOR DECLARES NOISE MUST STOP AT BAND CONCERTS

Mayor O. O. Alenderfer stated today when the matter was brought to his attention, that he would instruct the police hereafter to put a stop to the juvenile disorder that has existed for the past two years in the city park during band concerts. In addition, the mayor will also take steps to put a stop to a number of cars parked around the city park backing out with much noise while the band is playing. The mayor will instruct Chief of Police Adams to use his entire force if necessary, to accomplish this reform. While the trouble complained of has been existing for a long time past, the disorder at last night's fine concert by the D. O. K. band was the worst for years due to the fact that the big crowd attending was larger than usual—in fact was the largest that has heard a park concert for years. There was talk last night and today among a number of citizens of presenting a monster signed petition to the mayor and city council to take steps to make the concerts more of a pleasure, if the complained of juvenile disorder, especially, continued. At last night's concert by the D. O. K. band the noise of a crowd of children gathered about the fountain near where the band was playing was so great that, during a softly played number in which a baritone solo was being played, Wilson Waite, the director, became so disgusted that he stopped the playing of the band until the young disturbers were quieted and dispersed. Even the people in cars parked around the city park complain that because of the romping, running and yelling of the children they miss much of the music. The children themselves are not so much blamed as their parents. A few weeks ago at a concert the noise of the nearby children was so great that the band was much disturbed, and finally Ed White, one of the musicians in the back row seated in the outer row of the band, left his instrument long enough to chase the noisy crowd away. The next band concert will not be held in the city park until two weeks from last night because of the Crater Lake Temple band, D. O. K. K. being away in attendance at the northwest convention of the D. O. K. K. order at Aberdeen, Wash.

JOE McMAHON HAS A MINOR ACCIDENT

J. J. McMahon, the Medford district deputy state traffic officer, who is usually kept busy trying to prevent auto accidents, was on the wrong end of a minor accident last night in the business section of Ashland, between his special Buick six roadster and Clay Johns' special Studebaker six. In fact it was a very special accident. It seems that the state officer in his eagerness to keep an eye on another car suspected of containing a cargo of liquor, started to back his auto out from its parking place on a business street, just as Clay Johns, the Medford driver of one of the Crater Lake stages, off duty, came driving slowly along the street with his young lady companion. Both drivers sought to control their cars in time to avoid an accident, but ineffectually, as McMahon's car bent the fender of Johns' car and pressed against it so hard as to leave an impression on its body of a spare tire. Neither was to blame for the accident, but McMahon promptly told Johns to have his car fixed and that he would pay the bill. Big Sale in Electric Ranges. The Longfellows club idea was launched here in May and already the organization had spread as far as England, Ostlund reported. Clubs are being formed in all parts of the United States.
