### NEWS OF BRYAN'S DEATH RECEIVED HERE ON SUNDAY

The news of the unexpected and sudden death of William Jennings Bryan fast spread over the city early last evening, after it was received by telegraph by the Mail Tribune late in the afternoon, and created general sorrow and regret.

Manager Hunt bulletined the death on the screen at the Craterian and Rialto theaters as soon as apprised of the event by the Mail Tribune, and word of the event also gained rapid circulation in the churches.

So far as can be learned only one man in Medford and vicinity enjoyed a personal friendship with Mr. Bryan, and he is J. Frank Wortman, a friend of the great commoner for years and also one of the latter's most sincere admirers. Mr. Wortman learned of the sad news early in the evening and greatly deplored Mr. Bryan's passing.

An ardent friendship existed for many years between George Putnam, editor of the Salem Capital Journal, and former editor and publisher of the Medford Mail Tribune, and Mr. Bryan.

For years when Mr. Putnam was a resident of Medford it was Mr. Bryan's invariable custom when passing thru the city on his various lecture tours and other jaunts about the Pacific coast to wire ahead of his coming and for Mr. Putnam to meet him at the train so that they could have a visit during the train stop here.

Mrs. Ruth Owen left Mount Vernon, Ohio, for Dayton today but will divert her course to reach Washington before the body of her father, Mrs. Richard Hargreaves, the other daughter, is with her brother traveling east.

The decision to bury the former democratic chieftain among the country's military great in Arlington was the result of the expressed wish of Mr. Bryan, his widow told friends here. Mr. Bryan was a colonel of volunteers in the Spanish-American war.

A huge spreading maple tree shades the spot where the files of friends will look for the last time upon the face of their beloved champion. In this grassy eminence, raised four feet above the level of the street, Mr. Bryan was wont to sit and rest during the intervals of the trial of the Tennessee anti-evolution law. Here he greeted his friends and grasped the hands of hundreds who had come from the Cumberland slopes or from distant cities to witness the noted legal controversy in the Rhea county court.

DAYTON, Tenn., July 27.—(A. P.)—The body of William Jennings Bryan will lie in state this afternoon between the hours of two and five o'clock, while the public will be invited to view the body. Mrs. Bryan and a council of friends decided today. The place will be in the home where Mr. Bryan died or the Rhea county court house, where he fought his last great battle.

### WM. COLVIG HAS UNIQUE MEETING WITH OLD FRIEND

In the following news feature from Goldendale, Wash., the Portland Journal yesterday published the picture of Judge William L. Colvig of Medford, under the head of "Veterans Meet After 59 Years."

"A separation of 59 years did not dull the memory of James C. Hartley, early day Oregon pioneer and Indian fighter, for his old friend and comrade, William M. Colvig, Medford, Ore., when the two met recently at a party at the home of Mrs. May Blades, Hillsboro, Ore., in celebration of his 80th birthday anniversary.

"Dr. H. H. Hartley, Goldendale, and Mrs. Blades, son and daughter, planned a surprise on their father by inviting Colvig to visit with his old comrade of his Indian fighting days, whom he had not seen for nearly 60 years. When Colvig walked up to the porch of the Blades home he greeted his old comrade with a familiar salutation of 'hello Jim.'

"After looking him over with a quick glance, Hartley responded, 'I know you; you are Bill Colvig.'

"The elder Hartley, who has resided at Maryhill in Klickitat county for about 10 years, came west to the Willamette valley in 1864, spending the first winter near McMinnville. On January 18, 1865, he enlisted in Company C, first Oregon cavalry and was in active service in the Indian wars. Colvig was a member of the company when Hartley enlisted. Both were mustered out in the spring of 1866 and had not met since. Colvig is past 80 years. Five members of the original enlistment of 104 men in Company C, first Oregon cavalry survive."

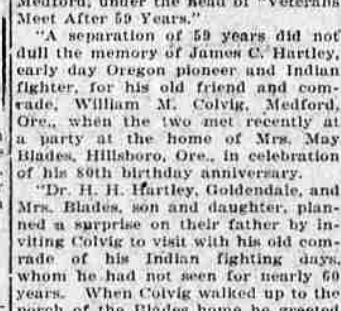
