

LEADING CITIZENS NIPPED, VIOLATION OF TRAFFIC LAWS

Sunday and the Crater Lake highway were very unlucky for two of Medford's prominent citizens, arrested by State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon for speeding. Besides the two arrests mentioned above he also arrested four others on the same day for various violations of the state traffic laws.

In Judge Taylor's court yesterday A. S. Rosenbaum, district passenger and night agent for the Southern Pacific lines, was fined \$25 for speeding on the Crater Lake highway at 45 miles an hour. Chauncey Florey, former county clerk, pleaded not guilty to a similar charge and was convicted and fined \$15. He was charged with speeding at an abnormal rate about curves in the highway.

C. T. Skeeters pleaded guilty to speeding and was fined \$10; T. DeVinney, an employe of the Hotel Medford, was fined \$10 on two charges, which included driving a motor vehicle without operator's license and without headlights.

R. A. Eggers, a former traffic officer of Gold Hill, was apprehended by McMahon for speeding a truck. He pleaded not guilty. His trial was set to take place this week. Likewise N. W. McGrew pleaded not guilty to a similar charge; his trial was set to take place next Thursday.

BRYAN'S SECRETARY DENIES HE PLANNED TO RUN 4TH TIME

DAYTON, Tenn., July 28 (A. P.)—Reports that William Jennings Bryan hoped to make another campaign for the presidency or he planned to make his advocacy of fundamentalism a means to such an end, are without foundation in truth, in so far as intimate associates of the dead statesman are able to know with certainty. Will E. Thompson, secretary to Mr. Bryan for the past four years, told the Associated Press today:

"I had this assertion not only on my intimate acquaintance with Mr. Bryan but on his own recent statement," Mr. Thompson said. "Mr. Bryan emphatically repudiated in this utterance any such purpose or expectation."

The last years of the commoner, the secretary asserted, were given over largely to religious affairs, advocacy of his principles of orthodoxy having supplanted to a large extent his active participation in the political world.

"Although his active political life was long before my connection with Mr. Bryan, I know from my close association with those who were with his household in those days and from Mr. Bryan's own remarks, that the defeats he sustained in his candidacies for the presidency had no embittering effect on his spirit," Mr. Thompson said.

"The former secretary of state used frequently to refer in good humor to his ill success in the national campaigns. He never lost his full confidence in the right and ability of the people to rule. Repeatedly he quoted with approval Mr. Jefferson's sentiments on the people."

"The final establishment of four great political principles for which he stood was regarded by Mr. Bryan as his far greater victory for him and his position than his election to the highest office in the nation would have been. These issues were national prohibition, a federal income tax, popular election of United States senators and woman suffrage."

"As for the silver plank, which has disappeared long ago as a national issue, Mr. Bryan held in his later years that the greatly increased world's production of gold provided by natural means the financial remedy which he, in his early years, believed must be provided by legislative enactment."

"The wonderful thing about Mr. Bryan was that what he said in the intimacy of his household was the same as his expressions of belief to the public. There was no difference between his public and private utterances. His talk at home and abroad was the same. This demonstrates his thorough sincerity."

NEW ENGLAND ELKS' SPECIAL WRECKED

GALLUP, N. M., July 28 (A. P.)—Sixteen persons were injured, none seriously, when the New England 13th special, running as special section of Santa Fe train number 19, was derailed by a washout 17 miles east of here this morning.

Mrs. John H. Dunn, wife of Brigadier General John H. Dunn, U. S. A., of Boston, was among the injured. She was not seriously hurt. General Dunn is national president of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.
