### FORMER TEACHER OF BRYAN DESCRIBES HIS EARLY TRAILS

LOS ANGELES, July 28.—(A. P.)—The man who taught geology to William Jennings Bryan nearly half a century ago, described here last night his impressions of the famous Nebraskan's characteristics while a student at Whipple academy, Jacksonville, Ill.

"I remember him very well when he entered the academy," said H. E. Storrs, formerly principal of the academy and professor in the affiliated institution of Illinois college.

"I remember him well. He was a typical farmer lad with all the crudities of that class. But I can say this for him—he never was a shirker. He never was under discipline during the time he was at the institution. He was a very Christian young man with a pleasing voice that won him attention many times.

"I remember he was continually raising questions in class—questions that had no part in the class work and one time I had to request him not to do it any more. He was very good about it and never did."

Young Bryan did not display any marked antipathy toward or suspicion of the science of geology, Storrs said.

"I must have done a pretty good job of teaching Bryan his geology in view of his fundamentalism, don't you think so?" the commoner's former instructor added with a smile.

"But then I've always been a fundamentalist myself—though not quite so strong as he was."

### PRESIDENT NOT FAVORABLE TO SENATOR'S PLAN

SWAMPSCOTT, Mass., July 28.—(A. P.)—President Coolidge believes the federal trade commission has a useful function and he is not in sympathy with suggestions that it should be abolished.

It was the president's conviction that while some of the criticisms of the trade commission is perhaps justified, it is performing a difficult task as the policeman of business and on the whole is performing a useful service to the public.

Mr. Coolidge is of the belief that some practices of the commission might well be modified so as to avoid possible injustices to legitimate industry and business, but he has not reached any conclusions as to what change in methods should be adopted.

Why on the way down here as I was leaving a restaurant at Albany, or maybe it was Eugene, when I stopped at the desk to pay my bill, the cashier said: 'Mister, do you know that while you were dining a customer came in, watched you a few seconds and remarked, 'I see you have a very distinguished man present among your diners.'"
