RUSSIAN GENERAL TO ADVISE CHINA

LONDON, July 28.—(A. P.)—A Reuters Canton dispatch says a Russian General Borodin, has been appointed advisor to the Canton government, succeeding Robert S. Norman, an American. (Mr. Norman is from Oakland, Calif., and was legal adviser to the late Dr. Sun Yat Sen, head of the Canton government.) The dispatch says the supreme command of the Canton government's army, navy and air force has been placed in the hands of Russians, whether "whites" or "reds" is not specified.

Nine coaches of the twelve-coach train were derailed. James A. Flaherty, supreme knight of the Knights of Columbus, Atlantic City, who had just returned today from Ireland, was injured. The cause of the derailment is believed due to a defect in one of the wheels of one of the rear chair cars which left the track first. Only the engine and first few coaches were left on the track.
