

# STEEL MAGNATE GOES ON A DIET, BUT ISN'T SICK

NEW YORK, July 28.—Eliot H. Gary, chairman of the United States Steel corporation, is back home after a second course in dietetics.

Ready for work in his office, he feels fit enough to eat pie and ice cream, he said, but he won't because the items are not on the list of things which the doctors think an eighty-year-old man ought to eat.

Mr. Gary denied that he went to the hospital of the Tennessee Coal and Iron company in Birmingham, Ala., because he was ill.

With advancing age, he said, he had noticed that pie and ice cream failed to agree with him. Mentioning this misfortune to Dr. Lloyd Noland, the hospital's head, he was promptly induced to learn what scientific eating was for a grey old man.

He is to eat little meat, starchy foods, fats or sweets, but plenty of green vegetables. Exercise, plenty of hard work and sleep, obeying the golden rule and keeping one's temper are also on the list of 14 rules for health.

# QUIET PREVAILS IN RIFFIAN WAR

FEZ, French Morocco, July 28.—(A. P.)—Calm reigns along the front in Morocco where the French troops are facing the rebellious Rifian tribesmen. The enemy is understood to have abandoned all idea of an offensive and the French are not yet ready to begin their move with a view of bringing the forces of Abd-el-Krim to terms. The airplanes alone are active, continuing to harass the Rifians, notably in the Beni Zeroual's country which in the last few days has received the attention of 23 bombing planes.

a real section of glass in the observation end.

It was banked high with floral designs and Koko Rice, Chattanooga officer, stood at attention at the head until the train reached Chattanooga.

Mr. Bryan was tenderly assisted into the car from an automobile by her chauffeur, William McCartney, W. E. Thompson, Mr. Bryan's secretary, and Wallace Hagard.

Photographers, by request of the Bryan party, refrained from any attempt to snap pictures of the invalid widow.

G. B. Abercrombie, of Chattanooga, and C. L. Winfrey, of Somerset, Ky., special police of the Southern railway, directed traffic at the Dixie highway crossing where the body of Mr. Bryan was taken aboard the car and the Bryan party entered.

The special car was attached to No. 42, Southern railway New York special with Walter White of Chattanooga, conductor in charge of the special car and another Pullman attached.

J. L. Meek, assistant division general passenger agent, accompanied the party on the trip to Washington and L. E. Woodall, division superintendent, accompanied it to Chattanooga.

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., July 29 (A. P.)—The train bearing the Bryan funeral party reached Knoxville at 2:35 this afternoon. The dead leader's remains were viewed by hundreds during the brief scheduled stop.

So dense was the crowds at the station and so eager the desire to view the body of the dead statesman that police on the rear platform had difficulty in restraining them.

Rapidly the missed watchers climbed to the special car and passed in rapid succession past the quiet face of the once great party chieftain.

A giant wreath of red roses, gift of the Association Bible class of the city was carried into the car where flowers already were heaped against the windows.

Hundreds despairing of seeing the body because of the press of humanity and the brief halt of the train ranged themselves upon the overhead viaduct and watched their fellows below. The train moved out of the station at 2:50.

# DISCOVER ANCIENT JERUSALEM WALL BUILT BY AGRIPPA

JERUSALEM.—Part of the wall enclosing Jerusalem built by Agrippa, one of the last Jewish kings, and destroyed by Titus, has been unearthed recently. About 60 yards of the wall, some four yards in thickness, have

been uncovered by the Jewish exploration society.

This discovery has aroused deep interest in archeological and religious circles. It is the third of the series of walls built around Jerusalem, it is argued, it brings into question the authenticity of the site of the Holy Sepulchre, which is thus placed outside the city walls.

The third wall was commenced by Herod Agrippa about 40-44 A. D. and was interrupted by the Roman governor of Syria, to be completed later by the Jews before the final siege on the north, built successively both for the protection of the weakest side of the defenses and to afford room for the steady growth of the city at the beginning of the Christian era. Both the

first and second walls were standing at the time of Christ and the place of crucifixion and burial must have been outside them.

Some scholars have contended that the site of the Holy Sepulchre is impossible because it is about within ancient Jerusalem, it being known that crucifixions did not take place within the city walls. Adherents of this view, especially a large number of the English community, who have always entertained doubts about the location of the Holy Sepulchre, see further confirmation in the discovery of what is believed to be the third wall.

# OREGON DEMOCRATS PLAN A MEMORIAL TO DEPARTED LEADER

PORTLAND, July 28 (A. P.)—A national memorial in honor of William Jennings Bryan was proposed here today at a meeting of Oregon democratic leaders with Dr. C. J. Smith, chairman of the state democratic central committee.

A committee of 25 with Governor Walter M. Pierce honorary chairman, and Milton A. Miller, former state senator, active chairman, was named to initiate the movement which it is intended to make nation-wide.

"We feel that the distinguished services rendered to the country by William Jennings Bryan entitle him to a national memorial and Oregon is taking the initiative in the movement," said Dr. Smith. "Nothing definite as to the nature of the memorial has been suggested yet, but we hope that it will be suitable, permanent recognition of the efforts of the great commoner in behalf of the welfare of the people of the country."


