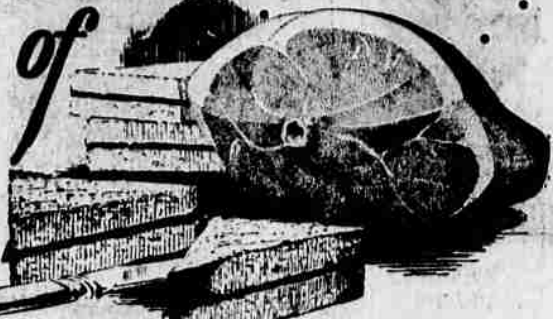

PROSPECTOR, 80, DIES 'NEATH WHEELS AT CROSSING WHEN SPEED MISJUDGED

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 29.—William H. Paisley, aged 80 years, an old prospector, who has spent many years in various parts of Oregon seeking mineral was accidentally killed yesterday afternoon at Glendale where he was struck by the locomotive of the second section of southbound S. P. train No. 11. Paisley and an aged companion have been batching in a cabin about two miles north of Glendale along the railroad right-of-way. Yesterday evening he started from the cabin to a spring, across the track, and on his way apparently misjudged the speed of the approaching train, and was struck by the pilot. His body was crushed and was rolled about three rail lengths before it was thrown to one side of the track. Death was evidently instantaneous. Coroner Ritter made an investigation of the accident, but did not deem an inquest necessary. The body is being shipped to Eugene in the morning and interment will take place there.

BILKER OF LOCAL WORKERS UNCAUGHT AND HEADED SOUTH

The man who gave an alias of Grant and "hired" over 70 men to fight a fictitious forest fire in Crater Lake national park as a pretended representative of park headquarters, has not yet been found. Local police have learned that he boarded a Pickwick stage and departed south yesterday for parts unknown.

"Grant" while working at the park gave his name as Norton, but when he was discharged and when he decided to avenge his dismissal he changed it to Grant.

If he should ever happen to return to the city there are nearly a hundred men who are desirous of meeting him in regard to the fictitious employment he had promised them. It is said that many of the laborers, who were bilked, discontinued their services at steady jobs, and that others bought entirely new equipment to take with them into the mountains.

At the appointed time when the men were supposed to leave yesterday morning, over 75 others beside those who had been promised employment at fire fighting, were also waiting with the vain hope that they, too, would be given a "job."

Grant is described as being about 23 years old, medium height, dressed in a logger's style, coarse in his actions, and very loud in his speech. Police officials believe he is suffering from mental trouble, which made him rather irresponsible for his actions of two nights ago.

ROMPING KIDS AND ROARING CARS AT CONCERTS CURBED

Oregon News in Brief

EUGENE, Ore., July 30.—Mark Broom, alleged moonshiner, must forfeit his car to the state of Oregon, according to a decision handed down here late yesterday in the Lane county circuit court by Judge G. F. Skipworth. Broom is held guilty by the judge of transporting liquor illegally.

Notice of seizure of the car was filed following Broom's arrest on June 1, and Broom answered the notice, seeking to retain the machine.

SALEM, Ore., July 30.—F. A. Raach, who for twelve years has been an examiner with the Oregon public service commission with headquarters in Portland, has resigned to accept an appointment as examiner in the railway division of the interstate commerce commission. The resignation was announced at the office of the Oregon commission here today.

EUGENE, Ore., July 30.—Harvey Jones, 12, son of Jacob Jones, who lives on Mosby Creek, near Cottage Grove, was drowned yesterday while attempting to ride a horse across the creek, according to word received here.

The reports stated that the boy fell off the horse when in midstream. It is believed that the horse, in swimming, kicked the boy after he had fallen in the stream.

Other small boys at the scene ran away after the accident and the accident would have been unknown at the time except for the arrival of a brother of the Jones boy. He could not swim, so called for help. A grappling hook, improvised from a rake, was used and the body was recovered 45 minutes after the Jones boy had been lost from sight.

Pleads for One Religious Creed



Adoption of a single creed by all of the Christian denominations was urged by the Rev. John McNaughton of Pittsburgh, at the twelfth quadrennial world council of the Reformed Churches, at Cardiff, Wales. He believes the step is necessary to save Christianity from the fate of its predecessor religions.

QUICK ACTION IN 2 GRASS FIRES

Two grass fires summoned the fire department to action yesterday afternoon, one of which could have been serious had it not been for the timely arrival of the department's chemical car. The other, which was on North Peach street, was not serious, two men quickly putting it under control.

The threatening fire, which occurred about 5 o'clock, was burning at the end of West Jackson just outside the city limits near a large wheat field owned by W. H. Gore, and had nearly ignited the field when it was put under control by the use of 70 gallons of chemicals.

OLDER GIRLS GROUP HERE, SEPT. 3 TO 7

The local chamber of commerce has received word that the State Council of Religious Education will hold their annual older girl conference in Medford this year from September 3 to 7, for southern Oregon from Eugene south. Over a hundred girls will attend the five-day meeting, and will be quartered at Medford homes during their brief stay.

It is planned by local citizens to take the girls to Crater Lake on September 7 if a sufficient number of cars can be procured. As the conference is still several weeks distant, it is expected the cars can be procured with little difficulty.

Lion Club Roars

Lion President Juddy took advantage of the prerogatives of his office at the meeting of the Lions club held Wednesday noon at the Hotel Medford and inflicted a speech on the assembled Lions concerning the gasoline and oil business in southern Oregon. The speech was very interesting, however, and was duly enjoyed by all present.

The new entertainment committee, composed of Doctors Elliott and Sleeter, is on the job and promise some good entertainment for the month of August.

Mr. Whillock of O. A. C. was a guest of the club and made a very interesting talk regarding the controversy between O. A. C. and the University of Oregon as to the various courses of the two colleges.

At the next meeting Mr. Walther will be present to explain the proposed water bond issue and other measures upon the ballot this coming September. It is hoped that a full attendance will be present as this is a matter of great importance to the whole community.
