## KUBLI PIANO OF PIONEER TIMES IS ADDED TO MUSEUM

The Native Daughters of Jacksonville came into possession of more valued relics for the Pioneer museum when the old Kubli piano in this city was turned over to its new owner. Mrs. E. J. Kubli presented to this historic organization the Kubli piano. It is an old square piano in redwood case and was very much desired by collectors of relics. The Native Daughters also had the privilege of bringing back to its original home in the Brunner building the old Paragon safe, made in New York in 1852. The safe was installed by Brunner Brothers soon after the erection of the building in 1855. It was later purchased by the late Mr. Kubli. The safe has no combination, but is opened by a large key, and this key is of particular value to the Kubli family, as each one of the children took his or her first step in an effort to reach it as it was held before them. Other relics—furniture, papers, interesting records of transactions of pioneer professional and business men, are also a part of the Kubli addition to the Native Daughters' collection.—Jacksonville Post.
