

NEW FOREST FIRE ON WIND RIVER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 31.—(A. P.)—A new forest fire in the Wind River region of Washington was reported today at the local forest service office. The fire broke out yesterday afternoon between Carson and Hemlock, and this morning had spread over more than 500 acres. Fire fighters were sent out from Hood River last night, and today forty more men were sent out.

The old fire in the Wind River region which has swept over 4000 acres, broke over the fire lines late yesterday, and the fire fighters worked swiftly to get it under control.

LETTER TELLS OF 2 WOMEN STARVING

LOS ANGELES, July 31 (A. P.)—A letter purporting to come from one of two elderly women suffering from starvation and poisoning in a cabin in the Santa Susana mountains, northwest of here, sent sheriff's deputies on a dash into the hills today on a rescue mission.

The women are Mrs. E. J. Pullen, who is homesteading there, and her friend, Mrs. Mary Koehler, a nurse. Mrs. Koehler's letter, which she said she was giving to a tramp to post, said water from a nearby spring had poisoned them and that they were without food.

UNIQUE FLIGHT TO FRISCO PLANNED

VANCOUVER, Wash., July 31 (A. P.)—Lieutenant Oakley G. Kelly, motor, plans to hop off from Vancouver barracks flying field tomorrow at 4 a. m. to fly to San Francisco where he will get 50,000 Fort Vancouver centennial half dollars, which were struck off by the mint in commemoration of the founding of Fort Vancouver, 100 years ago. He expects to reach San Francisco at 10 p. m. and to leave there at 11 a. m. He hopes to be back at Vancouver at 4 p. m. tomorrow.

ORDER NEW DETOUR PACIFIC HIGHWAY

ROSEBURG, Ore., July 31.—The county court today condemned and closed the detour over the old Goodrich highway, around the work being done on the Pacific highway near Oakland and ordered the contractor to provide a more convenient detour. The county court found that the road which it was proposed to open, took tourists from five to six miles out of

their way, over an old, abandoned and dangerous road and consequently they refused to allow it to be used. As the work around which the detour was arranged occupied only about 100 yards, the court decided the contractor could provide a better and shorter way around.

COOPER TURNS IN 60 IN 18 HOLES

NEW YORK, July 31.—(A. P.)—Harry Cooper's sensational 18-hole card of 60 at Dallas, Texas, yesterday, may stand as an American mark, but it is not the lowest score on record. George Duncan, noted British professional, is credited with shooting a 56 in an open golf championship event in Switzerland in 1913, a mark which is recognized as the record for tournament competition.

Walter Hagen's remarkable 62, scored in the Florida east coast championship at Belleair in 1923, has stood as the best American performance for important competition.

BREEZE FANS ANEW FOREST EMBERS

OLYMPIA, Wash., July 31 (A. P.)—Revived by freshening winds a forest fire set by lightning several days ago southeast of Rockport, Skagit county, is assuming serious proportions. It was reported to the state forestry offices this morning by Duncan McCay, district warden at Sedro-Wooley. A crew of 80 men is working to control the blaze while additional forces will be put on as soon as possible.

The fire is burning over a scattered area about two miles long. It was reported to George C. Joy, supervisor of forestry, who estimated that it had probably covered an area of 600 acres.

LEFT FIRE BURNING, TO BE ARRESTED

EUGENE, Ore., July 31.—Ten forest fires have been reported in the Cascade forest within the past ten days, according to the report issued today by Nelson F. MacDuff, supervisor.

Four of the fires were started by lightning and six were man-caused. Alfred Sorensen, employe of the bureau of public roads, will be arrested on charges of leaving his camp fire burning, according to a complaint sworn out today. The fire was left in the Cascade national forest.

ITALIAN TOWN IS QUAKE SHAKEN

FOGGIA, Italy, July 31.—(A. P.)—Earthquake shocks were felt here today. A hundred houses and a municipal building being damaged. Some of the houses were rendered uninhabitable, but no one was injured. The shocks were especially severe at Cerignola.

Foggia, capital of the province of the same name, is 30 miles northeast of Naples. It has a population of about 50,000.

CHILD'S DROWNING HELD SUSPICIOUS

FRISCO, Calif., July 31 (A. P.)—County officers today went to Auberry to investigate the drowning of Lucy Hutchins, 6-year-old daughter of George Hutchins, an Indian resident of the mountain community. At first reported as an accidental death, the tragedy has developed into a possible premeditated taking of life by other Indian children, according to Coroner John N. Little.

GRAIN THRESHING NOW UNDER WAY

Grain threshing is at its apex in this section. Although the greater part of the grain has already been cut and stacked, some is being cut by binders, while other grain fields are still standing awaiting the arrival of a combined harvester which is operating in the valley.

The best yields to the acre of wheat is conservatively estimated as being over 40 bushels, while the average is nearly 25 bushels.
