Decorative Tin Containers Have Many Uses

The attractive jewelry case and sewing box are merely empty tin containers lined with satin.

DON'T throw away those pretty, highly decorated candy and cake boxes of tin. They have some very practical uses when empty as well as being decorative ornaments in the room. You don't often even find a glaring advertisement on them any more, which makes them all the more valuable for "catch-alls."

The large tin candy boxes, round and oblong in shape, are beautifully decorated, make quite as good fancy-work receptacles as did the Chinese baskets confectioners were using two or three years ago. Even better, for if one is going to spend the summer at the sea, or is going abroad, there is nothing equal to a tin box that will keep out dampness and prevent the scissors, needles and other metal from rusting.

Then there are the boxes for the dresser or the dresser drawer. With the aid of a little satin, perhaps a quilted remnant from the scrap bag, one of these boxes may be lined for a jewelry case, while another may be lined and scented for handkerchiefs and gloves.

Every woman knows the annoyance of finding her manicure articles covered with rust if she has

ever spent a summer by the sea. This can be prevented if the manicure things are kept in a tightly covered tin box. Either a round or a square box may be used for this purpose and the inside lined or not to suit the taste.

The small round container will make an excellent powder box with a puff to fit. If it should happen to have a trade mark in the middle of the cover, it may be hidden by pasting on a disk of cretonne or paper. To this disk may be attached, for a handle, a little knob such as one gets at the ten cent store.

Another use for the smaller and deeper round tin box is to make a cord container of it. This is done by simply boring a hole in the top of the cover. The same device as given for the powder box may be used if this cord container bears a trade mark.

The hole for the cord can then be bored through the bit of cretonne or paper.

There are so many more uses to which these decorative boxes may be put that the housewife is beginning to appreciate the service the confectioner and cake baker render with their metal containers.
