MAIL TRIBUNE BEATS KLAMATH IN CLOSE GAME

A tired but happy bunch of printers showed up for work this morning at The Mail Tribune plant after their invasion of Klamath Falls Sunday where they defeated the Klamath Falls Herald baseball team, 15 to 13.

The contest was staged as a benefit entertainment to help swell the fund being raised to provide street signs for Klamath Falls, and Klamath merchants and others donated liberally in the way of prizes for the players.

In the fourth inning Reese Baughman, Medford first baseman, was hit by a pitched ball and upon showing signs of distress was hastily hauled to a waiting ambulance and hauled to first base where he was deposited carefully in the dust while a moving picture man ground away at his camera filming the incident, which with other high lights of the game will be shown in the Oregonian news reel.

COLLEGE PLAYERS TO TAKE PLACE HIGH PAID MINOR STARS

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—Gradual replacement of the minor leagues by the college diamond as the hope of the major leagues for rebuilding their teams is seen as one of the outstanding developments of the 1925 season by President John A. Heydler of the National league in a resume today.

"A college player has four years of training. It is not as strenuous and probably not as useful and helpful as four years of minor league training, but on the other hand, it is reasonable to assume that the college player will better the majors for his mind better trained and his mental faculties better developed to acquire big league education."

MINING NEWS OF SOUTHWESTERN OREGON

Edited by Southwestern Oregon Mining Bureau.

Registry of Mines Notes.
Under this heading the bureau will from time to time publish data regarding properties recorded in the registry of mines without identifying data other than county in which located. Such properties, unless otherwise specifically noted, are open for development, either through sale, lease and bond, or financial assistance to the owner. bona fide inquirers will be placed in direct touch with the owners and thus avoid unwarranted speculation.

Registry No. 141—Location, Jackson county, Oregon; claims held by location. Vein—one to seven feet wide; on contact; foot wall porphyry; hanging wall, shist; dip, 80 degrees. Minerals—Gold, silver and lead; values in main ledge run from \$9 to \$26 per ton. Development—Wort: 200-foot tunnel; 30 to 40 tons on dump; water for milling purposes; plenty of timber; 12 miles from the nearest postoffice.

Chicago Man Interested At Galice
Dr. A. W. Seidel, eastern representative of the Western Metal Mines company, left last week for his home in Chicago, going via San Francisco, after spending two weeks on his annual survey of his company's operations in the Galice district.

There are many properties that have not been registered. To the owners the bureau extends a direct invitation to place these properties on record for the owners' benefit. It costs nothing, yet it permits the owner to have an equal opportunity with all other owners to have the facts regarding his property brought to the attention of every investor who examines the registry.

Stephen Kranitz of Jacksonville, who owns mining property of merit on the Upper Applegate near the famous old Sterling placer mine, became a member of the bureau last week and the first thing he did was to register his property.

Mining men having knowledge of dredging ground, whether they own it or not, may be placed in direct touch with an engineer on the spot for such property. Large acreage is desired and other details must be reasonably favorable to gain the attention of this experienced engineer.

Ready for Mill Installation
The Pleasant Creek Mining company, with large holdings on Pleasant creek in the upper Evans creek district, have been quietly developing its property for four years, and they are now preparing for the installation of milling equipment this fall for the treatment of the ores and the recovery of the gold values. The company has 80 claims and the average value of the ore in gold is said to be \$12.20. The company is composed of Michigan capital, and James E. Ryan is in charge of the development work.

PROSECUTION OF PROHI DIRECTOR IS ARRANGED FOR

SALEM, Aug. 3 (A. P.)—Attorney General Van Winkle said today that he has not yet received a request from Governor Pierce to take charge of the prosecution of District Attorney Elliott of Klamath county. William S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner and L. L. McBride, one of Levens' aides.

According to Van Winkle, Elliott is not disqualified to prosecute any of the cases except the one against himself, and in his case the law would apply which provides that when the district attorney is disqualified to act it is the duty of the circuit judge to appoint an attorney to prosecute. Van Winkle said he received a request Saturday from Elliott to take charge of the case, and that he informed Elliott relative to the law.

Elliott was indicted by the Klamath county grand jury of failing to account for some sugar confiscated in a liquor raid. Levens and McBride were indicted for the alleged larceny of a revolver.

SALEM, Aug. 3 (A. P.)—Former Circuit Judge C. F. Stone of Klamath Falls has offered his services to defend William S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, who is under indictment there on a charge of larceny of a revolver, according to information received by Governor Pierce. L. L. McBride, one of Levens' aides, is accused also of that offense.

GAS TANK BREATHING CAUSES HEAVY LOSS, POWER BY RADIO
Los Angeles, Aug. 3.—(A. P.)—How science solves the problems of industry will be explained by technical experts of national and international renown during the seventeenth meeting of the American Chemical Society opening here tonight.

These tanks which laboratory theorists are called upon to perform for a practical world range from the development of a formula to prevent mayonaisse dressing from "breaking" to the stupendous problem of radio transmission of power.

In the division of petroleum, gas and fuel, chemistry alone, more than scores of papers will be presented, one of the most interesting of which from the layman's point of view will describe methods evolved to prevent "breathing losses" in stored gasoline.

Being a member of the southwestern Oregon mining bureau Dr. Seidel reviewed the work done, and being done, by that organization, and praised the effort being made to further the mining interest, but gave it as his opinion that no policy would be too harsh for the betterment of mining and mining policies.

Connected with one of our sound and progressive mining organizations as he is, the doctor is familiar with views and conditions on mining from the outside, and his expressions are welcome as worthy of earnest consideration as we need more and more information as to how mining in southwestern Oregon is looked upon by men of importance on the outside.
