Oregon passed California in the production of apples in 1924, with 5,250,000 boxes, against 4,422,000 in California, according to figures of the food-stuffs division of the department of commerce. In 1923 California was ahead by a good margin, 6,200,000 to 5,250,000. It will be observed that Oregon held at the same figure, while California sustained a big drop. Washington is far in the lead of all the states in apple production in 1924, as it has been for several years. It is credited with 19,950,000 boxes.

DEFENSE STARTED IN PICKFORD CASE

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4.—(A. P.)—The jury was excused today until 2 o'clock this afternoon and defense attorneys from behind great piles of law books plunged into their arguments supporting their motion of yesterday for an instructed verdict of not guilty in the trial of the three men accused of plotting to kidnap Harry Pickford, film star.

The trio of defendants, composed of Adrian Wood, Claude Holcomb and C. Z. Stephens, listened only intermittently to the verbal barrage of their attorneys as it stirred the lazy summer air of the courtroom.

PORTLAND, Aug. 4.—Authorities were trying today to obtain some clue that would explain the death of a man whose occupation body was found in the Columbia river near the mouth of the Willamette river last night. Deputy Coroner Buckley said the head had been severed apparently with a sharp instrument. The man was a little under middle age. A pair of overalls and a khaki shirt covered the body, which had apparently been in the water about a week. There were no marks on the body.

Jackson Hot Springs. The report that hot springs near Medford are closed seems to have been mistaken for Jackson Hot Springs. These springs are not closed and the report of the Oregon Testing Laboratory published in full in this paper on Saturday, August 1st, shows the exact analysis of the water with the statement that it is impossible for germs to live in any minerals shown in the analysis.

FOREST FIRES IN WASHINGTON AND MONTANA SERIOUS

MISSEUILA, Mont., Aug. 4.—(A. P.)—Forest fires in the Clearwater, St. Joe, Couer d'Alene and Kanikou districts in northern Idaho and western Montana, have been scattered over large areas by heavy winds, late yesterday and today.

During the last ten days there have been 475 fires in district one, the second largest number in history. There were 485 fires in the same period of 1924. The fire season this year, to August 1, shows 2968 fires burned over 17,629 acres in district one.

SPOKANE, Aug. 4.—Advisers received by the Chronicle today said that all the men of Weippe, Idaho, had been drafted for service in combating fires in the Clearwater national forest and that officials were preparing a list of available business men of Orofino who could be commanded for service on the fire lines.

Forest rangers in the Clearwater district were forced from their cabins and compelled to desert the lookout station in the Big Lake district when a fire burning in a virgin stand of white pine threatened their habitations.

A new fire on Gold Creek, in the holdings patrolled by the Clearwater Timber Protective association, is rapidly eating its way through a virgin stand of white pine timber. This timber is said to be some of the finest in the northwest.

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TARIFF HEARING SEATTLE, STARTS

SEATTLE, Aug. 4.—(A. P.)—J. H. Biedel of Seattle, the first witness at a hearing here of the United States tariff commission on logs imported from Canada, testified today that timber from north of the line, with the tariff of \$1 a thousand feet added, costs less than American.

Chairman Marvin and Vice-Chairman Dennis of the commission were expected to conclude the hearing by Saturday. Afterward they are to take up halibut.

Marvin announced that the purpose of the inquiry was to decide whether reduction of the duty on logs should be recommended to President Coolidge to cut it one-half.
