## NEW RECORD FOR TOURIST TRAVEL TO CRATER LAKE

Tourist travel into Crater Lake national park broke all July records, with a total of 7667 cars and 25,344 visitors. The influx was especially heavy through the Medford entrance, that gate surpassing last year's record with a total of 13,992 visitors, as compared with 12,274 last year.

The Klamath entrance follows with a total of 7880 visitors, as compared to last year's 8295, the balance being distributed between night travel at Aunz Spring and travel through the East and North entrances. Stage travel has increased 8.8 per cent. Ninety-eight per cent of the travel entered in private cars.

The entire park road system is open. Reconstruction of roads is being carried on at a fast pace. The contractors, the Warren Construction company of Portland, expect to begin laying pavement about August 31st. They are organized and equipped on a large scale, so that the work is proceeding at the very rapid rate necessary to accomplish results in the short season in the Cascades.

During the past week lightning caused five fires in the park, none of them serious except one in the northwest punice section near Red Cone, in an area where about sixty per cent of the trees have been killed by beetles during the last decade.

This standing dead lodgepole pine is veritable tinder, so that it took a considerable crew forty-eight hours to bring the fire to the ground and under complete control. The park is now free of active fires.

The park bears are not performing on schedule, only three or four appearing daily at government camp, the balance having established headquarters at the various road construction camps, ranger stations and other outlying kitchens. Naturalists assert that the canny animals already sense the fact that they are legally protected throughout southern Oregon, and feel safe to range more widely.

As further proof of the sagacity of the black bear, it was noted that not a single one of the bruin tribe was seen on July 29th, during the stay at Crater Lake of Jess Willard, ex-champion heavy weight of the world.

## FORTUNE IN DRUGS SEIZED IN RAID ON CHICAGO APT.

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(A. P.)—A fortune in narcotics, found in an apartment which had all the fixtures of an oriental drug den was seized by federal agents last night.

They arrested Kitty Kilbooley, who with her husband, Willie, they charged with carrying on a wholesale traffic that would handle nothing less than \$5000 sales. The value of the drugs confiscated was variously estimated between \$14,000 and \$250,000 with an additional \$10,000 worth of pipes and weighing and measuring requisites.

Pat Roche, ace of the special intelligence unit of the internal revenue department, who led the raid, said the woman had been the biggest importer of drugs in the middle west and could supply any amount on short notice.

Four men were arrested as peddlers and search was started for twenty more. During the fortnight the government men watched the den, they said more than 100 nationally known underworld characters visited it.

The contraband seized, which Roche thought represented only a ten day's supply included:

- \$4,700 grains of morphine, valued at \$1 a grain.
- 27,500 grains of cocaine, \$1 a grain.
- 100 pounds of gum opium, \$175 a pound.
- 75 pounds of cooked opium, \$200 a pound.

## WOMEN CHEMISTS DISCUSS PROBLEMS AT L. A. CONVENTION

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5 (A. P.)—Men who complain of the frivolity of feminine chatter might be alarmed for an opposite reason if they overheard the conversation that goes on between delegates of the American Chemical association's 79th meeting here today.

These women, who have come to the convention from various industrial laboratories, universities and government research bureaus, have much to say about plant enzymes, the copper content of distilled liquor, the place of pectin in commercial jelly making, the preparation of larabiose from mesquite gum—not to speak of more complicated subjects. Much of their professional work is done in the fields of foods, drugs, dyes and cosmetics, according to Miss Ruth Buchanan, research chemist of the bureau of chemistry, Washington, one of the prominent women delegates.

"We analyze new food, new drugs, new dyes, new perfumes, new face creams," she said.

Some of us specialize in cereal chemistry, others have won honor in pathological research.

"But of course the convention here is primarily a convention of men and it cannot be denied that men still are the real leaders in the field of chemistry."

Four other jailors testified that they believed Scott sane.

Assistant State's Attorney Harry N. Prigler had a list of 59 jailors ready to testify, but Judge David limited him to 14 lay witnesses and five attorneys.

In probably another day a jury will consider whether Russell Scott is sane and should be hung or mentally deficient and therefore immune from the execution of the death sentence from which he twice narrowly has escaped.

The defense attorneys have finished their testimony that he suffers from delusions, paranoic dementia and is not oriented to his surroundings in jail.

Evidence as to his mental condition has been limited to matters tending to establish development since February 14 last, when he was sentenced to die.

This restriction was imposed by Judge Joseph B. David when attorneys for Scott sought to bring out by testimony that he had an hereditary basis for mental disorders and that circumstances attending his birth were unusual. The proffered testimony of Mrs. Rilla Scott, his mother, was held incompetent.

## MRS. COOLIDGE TAKES SWIMMING LESSONS

EUGENE, Aug. 5.—Mark Broom was found guilty by a circuit court jury here yesterday afternoon of transportation of liquor. He will be sentenced Saturday.

## CHILDREN GIVEN BY COURT TO WIFE IN DIVORCE SUIT

In a finding handed down by the circuit court, the motion of Bertram C. Chapman against his wife, Zella Viola Chapman, asking for a modification of a divorce decree and custody of the children, the motion was denied and the children left in the care of the mother. A hearing on the motion was held last week.

Chapman charged, by affidavit, that the defendant was not a fit and proper person for the custody of the children, chiefly on the alleged relations with one Harold Shook. A counter affidavit denying these charges was also filed. Most of the witnesses were from Etta Mills, Cal., where Mrs. Chapman is employed as a cook in a mining camp.

The court in a memorandum denying the motion said:

"The above order shall be considered only as temporary. The court is far from satisfied that the relationship between the mother of the children and Shook is all it should be, and should any change occur in the situation the father will be granted another hearing."

The hearing on the motion was replete with vivid testimony and Attorney Kelly, for Chapman, in examining Shook, characterized him as "a home buster."

All the parties to the action are well known in this city and Jacksonville.

## BRITISH LEGATION AT WUCHOW LOOTED

CANTON, Aug. 5.—Reports received today say that looting of the British consulate at Wuchow, 180 miles west of Canton, took place immediately after the building was ordered abandoned as the result of the anti-foreign Chinese.

The situation in Canton is quiet, but the strike of Chinese workers continues. At the French concession in Shameen, the international settlement natives have been imported to replace striking Chinese servants.

Chu Chao-Wu, the Chinese leader, is seriously ill at a hospital here and trouble is feared at any time between the "red" and the "anti red" faction of the controlling Chinese military group.
