

ORDINANCE FOR NEW CITY WATER BEING PREPARED

The city administration and city water commission have been very busy for a long time past, threshing out the details of the big bond election for a new water system, which will be held early in October, and at which special election will also be submitted the annexation of several outlying districts, the city hall-courthouse removal propositions and incidental charter amendments, and some minor questions.

The next few days will be centered on preparations for the water bond system election, and in this connection the city water commission met informally with the city council last night, at which time H. L. Walther, chairman of the commission, explained the details of the information he and City Attorney John H. Carlin secured in their conferences with Portland bond houses and with a leading legal firm of Portland that passes on municipal bond matters.

All this information will soon be given to the Medford public, along with complete details of the proposed new system and the urgent necessity for its establishment. From time to time during the 60 days before the election every angle of the water situation will be made public.

Following the informal meeting last night the city council adjourned to meet again Thursday night at which time City Attorney Carlin hopes to have the water bond ordinance ready, which calls for the special election and gives the details of that election.

Each ordinance must be read and voted on three times, hence the councilmen have a tedious and long task before them that night. The other ordinances for the other special matters to be voted on at the October special election have all been prepared.

In case the water bond ordinance should not be ready by Thursday evening, the meeting must be held and the ordinance voted Friday evening, 60 days before the election. This is required by law.

MAIN ST. FIRE QUICKLY PUT OUT BY FIRE DEPT.

Defective wiring caused a fire in the rear of the Heddingfield confectionery establishment on Main and Bartlett streets early this morning, which would have been serious had it not been for the prompt arrival of the fire department, which extinguished the blaze while still in an incipient stage. The financial loss was slight.

According to Fire Chief Roy Elliott a nail had been driven through the molding covering the electric wiring on the ceiling and had made contact with the wire causing a short circuit.

William Jones, proprietor of the West Side Shoe Shining parlors, rooms directly above the confectionery store, which came through the cracks of the floor, J. E. Kincaid, who has a taxi stand nearby, had not yet gone home, and to him Mr. Jones gave the alarm of fire.

The department used five gallons of chemicals in quenching the blaze, which was burning in the ceiling. After thirty minutes of fighting the danger was over.

The building, which is constructed of wood, is two stories high, has home-keeping rooms on the upper floor, Heddingfield's confectionery and Ellwood's Optical shop on the lower floor. It is owned by Mrs. E. M. Warner, and was condemned by the fire chief several years ago.

U. S. AMBASSADORS' BODY VIEWED BY CROWDS IN TOKIO

TOKYO, Aug. 5.—(A. P.)—The body of the late Edgar A. Bancroft, American ambassador to Japan, who died at Karuzawa, on July 28, arrived here today. The body was transported in a special car provided by the Japanese government and escorted by United States naval and military attaches from the American embassy.

Foreign Minister Shidehara, representatives from the Imperial household and numerous other prominent persons met the train as it arrived at the station which was draped in mourning colors. The body was taken from the train to St. Andrews cathedral along streets guarded by special police. A large crowd at Ueno station silently uncovered their heads as they observed the cortege.

The body was viewed by hundreds of Japanese and American friends of the Ambassador when the casket was opened at the church between four and six p. m. Great masses of flowers and wreaths from Japanese officials and American organizations filled the church. Lieutenant Commander Hein, naval attaché at the American embassy will accompany the body to the cruiser Tama which will sail tomorrow according to the announced plan.

Both of the aviators were safe. Six machines began the flight without accident.
