### JULY A RECORD MONTH FOR DRY, HOT WEATHER

The outstanding feature of last month's weather was its record-breaking warmth and dryness, with a mean of 75.38, whereas the average temperature for July in the history of the local weather bureau is 71.3. Only a mere trace of rain fell during July, the average rainfall for which month is .43 of an inch.

The highest temperature of last month was 106 degrees on the 16th, during a several days' high temperature period, and the coldest temperature of the month was 59 degrees on the 25th. The mean maximum for the month was 95.13, the mean minimum was 55.54, and the greatest daily range was 48.

Twenty-three days of July were clear, seven days were partly cloudy and one day was cloudy. The last rain to fall in Medford was on June 7th last when .01 of an inch fell.

### FOUR VIOLATORS TRAFFIC LAWS FINED IN COURT

Four traffic cases were disposed of in Justice Taylor's court and one in Justice Roe's court at Jacksonville yesterday. The amount of fines assessed ranged from \$10 to \$25.

At Jacksonville C. B. Johnson, a truck driver of Gold Hill pleaded guilty to two charges and was fined \$20 on each. The two complaints lodged against him by the state traffic officer, C. P. Talent, were for operating a truck while overloaded and driving without a chauffeur's license.

In Medford J. G. Beckett of Portland forfeited \$25 cash bail by non-appearance to answer a charge of speeding placed against him by state traffic officer J. J. McMahon. On his plea of guilty to operating a motor vehicle with improper adjustment of its spotlight, A. F. Beaudieu a local man, was fined \$10. C. P. Talent was the arresting officer. G. E. Berdel was fined \$10 for speeding a truck and G. A. Turia, a tourist, was fined a like amount on his plea of guilty to a similar charge. Both arrests were made by McMahon.

### WATERMELON THIEF SHOT BY FARMER

A young man who refused to give his name was treated this morning by Dr. A. F. Kresse for wounds received in his arm, caused by buckshot fired from a shotgun in the hands of an irate farmer in the Phoenix district, in whose watermelon patch the man had trespassed last night. The injured man was a member of a group of young men traveling north by automobile, and had stopped at an auto camp near the town of Phoenix. The wounds were not serious and the would-be watermelon bandit departed this forenoon, together with his companions. Local authorities could not secure the name of the farmer, who apparently refused to bring action against the trespassers.
