

WOODROW WILSON FILM TO BE SHOWN MEDFORD, AUG. 30

Through the efforts of the pastors of the First Methodist and the South Methodist churches of this city, the remarkable film memorial of the late President Wilson has been secured for a presentation in Medford. This "Six Reels of Real Wilson" will be shown Sunday evening, August 30, at 8 o'clock at the First Methodist church.

From a historical point of view the Wilson picture is declared to be epochal in that it shows all the prominent leaders of all the nations of the world during the last decade in an intimate way. The appealing characteristic of the screen-biography of Woodrow Wilson, which has won for it such universal approval, appears to be in its truthfulness. It is said to depict not only the stupendous rise of Mr. Wilson to prodigious power, showing him practically worshipped by the peoples of the world, but just as vividly portrays his descent into the equivalent of oblivion, deserted in his "87" street home and dying a martyr to his ideals.

This film memorial is the work of the Woodrow Wilson Memorial society, which is devoted to the perpetuation of the late president's memory in film form as contrasted with the memorials of bronze and stone. It is pointed out that whereas monuments of bronze and stone are lifeless and must be visited to impress people, the Wilson film memorial is as near to a living memorial as can possibly be attained, which goes to the people everywhere, and it has been repeated all over the country that this memorial is actually comparable only to a visit from Woodrow Wilson himself.

This memorial has been presented by more than 160 educational and religious institutions of the Pacific coast. It is never shown at a commercial theater and can only be shown one time in a community for many years.

It is understood that President Coolidge plays an important part in this unique memorial of one of our great Americans, and the press comments that have come indicate that the republican newspapers and leaders have been as eulogistic of the film memorial as newspapers and leaders of Wilson's own political faith.

COUNTY DIVORCES NOW TOTAL 43

The forty-third divorce suit of the year for Jackson county, was filed in the circuit court Thursday, when Violet Walters started suit against Harry Walters, charging cruel and inhuman treatment. They were married at Vancouver, Washington, October 5, 1918.

The complaint alleges that the defendant "possessed a quick temper," cursed and called her vile names, criticized unnecessarily and found fault, was of a jealous disposition, unaffectionate, unreasonable, and excessively overbearing an abusive by nature, and that he "neglected, belittled and abused" the plaintiff.

MONKEY BILL FILED IN FEDERAL COURT

KNOXVILLE, Tenn., Aug. 7.—The Tennessee evolution case was brought to federal court when John R. Neal, attorney representing James Robert Wilson, a taxpayer, filed a bill in federal court seeking to test the constitutionality of the Tennessee act against the teaching of evolution in the public schools of the state.

Governor Austen Peay, Attorney General Frank M. Thompson and District Attorney General Thomas L. Stewart of the Dayton district, are made defendants by the bill.

Riff Hopes Droop as France Concentrates Crack Troops



France unsuccessful in its initial campaigns, is concentrating its finest troops, under its best generals, in Morocco, determined to conquer once and for all "the Berber Wild Cat." Two marshals of France, Petain and Lyautey, and five generals, Naulin, Colombat, De Chamberun, Heusch and Bertrand, are leading the 150,000 troops arrayed against Abd-el-Krim, rebel war lord, and Riff hopes are drooping. A crack French regiment is seen on the march to the battlefront.

MAZAMA LEADER INJURED IN FALL JEFFERSON PEAK

PORTLAND, Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—John D. Scott, leader of a Portland party of the Mazamas club, which set out this week to scale Jefferson peak, was injured Wednesday on the mountain, and is being carried on an improvised stretcher along the Skyline trail. His bearers left Conception camp, in Jefferson Park at 7 a. m. today, and intend taking him to Government camp, from where he can be brought to Portland by auto.

Reports by telephone from a member of the party, relayed through Albany today, said Scott jumped into a snow field to get out of the way of a falling rock chimney, that he slid to the bottom of the field, and there struck a large rock. One hip was badly hurt.

EUGENE REPORTS ANOTHER ROBBERY

EUGENE, Aug. 7 (A. P.)—The Towne Shoppe, local restaurant, was entered and robbed of \$75 in cash last night, it was reported to the police this morning. The invader entered through the back, cutting a screen, and broke open the cash register. The robbery occurred some time between 1 and 4:30 in the morning.

The robbery was the second in as many nights, the Elks lodge safe having been blown Wednesday night, and approximately \$200 taken.

Radio News

PITTSBURGH, Aug. 7.—(A. P.)—Termed by experts as revolutionizing the broadcasting of radio programs, a special selective antennae was placed in operation for the first time last night by the Westinghouse Electric and manufacturing company. Invented by Frank Conrad, assistant chief engineer of the Westinghouse company, the antennae is designed to pick up only certain signals from a certain direction, eliminating interference from the booster station, a great source of interfering heretofore, according to radio engineers.

The special antennae operated last night was at KFKA, Pittsburgh, to the western station. Here it was intercepted on the special antennae and there amplified and put on the air again at the same frequency of wave lengths.

The antennae, said H. P. Davis, vice-president of the Westinghouse company, makes possible the amplification of radio waves without changing their form or frequency. "It is a real milestone in radio achievement," he said. "It provides the radio engineer with the thing he has been searching for to further his dream of making radio a practical, dependable method of communication over long distances which could not be accomplished with the use of so-called super-power."

He added that the new system transmission dependable at great distances without loss of signal strength and free from static and other interference.
