

# ART EXHIBIT AT ASHLAND CLOSES SUMMER SCHOOL

ASHLAND, Aug. 8.—One of the finest exhibits in art work ever shown in Ashland was displayed Friday afternoon and evening at the Civic club house by the Summer School of Art, which has just closed its five weeks' session at Junior High building. However six weeks' work was embraced in the five, for Saturday was a school day. There were fifteen classes, of 45 hours each.

Members of the faculty were present to discuss and explain the work. Tables and walls were filled with the work of the pupils from the different departments. Under the craft work one saw daily specimens of book binding, of dyeing, batik, Swedish darning, block printing, stenciling, costume designing, and also the finished product, lovely gowns all ready to wear. The Commercial Drawing and Public School methods department displayed a wonderful collection of the work of the pupils; posters, lettering, pencil, water color, ink and oil, all made a most unusual showing.

Under the department of interior decoration, a wonderful display of textiles made a delightful setting; artistic lamp shades, notebooks by the pupils, and, by the way the notebooks were worth more than a cursory glance for in these books was the scheme of the course, from floor plans to the finished room, complete in every detail, indicating a rather complete knowledge in house furnishing and arrangement.

The Landscape and Still Life exhibit was especially noteworthy, made up of the work of the pupils under the direction, Miss Belle Cady White, a few of whose pictures were also shown. In all, the subjects were found right here at home: bits of beauty, perhaps unnoticed unless the appreciative and

artistic eye placed it where many might enjoy it. Altogether it was an hour well spent in seeing what may be accomplished under skilled teachers.

The faculty of the Summer School of Art included Miss Belle Cady White, director; Miss Ethel Weightman, crafts and costume designing; H. C. Standtner, commercial drawing and public school methods; Watterson Lowe, the department of interior decoration. This closes the school's second season in Ashland. Those who attended, and those who wish to take advantage of the splendid opportunity afforded by the school are anticipating next summer's session.

# CHINESE DANGER ONLY ECONOMIC, ARMY IS A JOKE

SEATTLE, Aug. 8.—(A. P.)—A. Archibald Bullock, head of the department of education of the central China teachers' college for the last 26 years, who is visiting the United States on a vacation, declared here yesterday that "Chinese difficulties have been variously attributed to instability of government, to economic straits, and to dollars and cents."

"Primarily," he said, "it is an awakening of national consciousness. As to the foreign element, unless some conciliatory gesture is made soon, the Chinese student body, together with Chinese laborers and merchants have it within their power to bankrupt foreign firms in a nation-wide economic boycott."

"The danger to foreigners is commercial rather than physical. Physically I feel safer in China than here. There is less danger of deliberate injury by violence or accident."

Bullock declared the Chinese situation was hugely exaggerated. Military maneuvers he compared to the "barking of a pack of dogs." He departed for Portland yesterday from where he is to journey to his home in Los Angeles.

# BRITISH LIQUOR SHIP CAPTURED ALABAMA COAST

MOBILE, Ala., Aug. 8.—(A. P.)—The British schooner Wanderer with 575 cases of prohibited liquor on board valued at \$15,000, was towed into port yesterday by the coast guard cutter OGT-200. The liquor will be unloaded into a special government warehouse for safe keeping. The Wanderer was seized off Chandler islands two weeks ago.

Federal officials intimated today that Captain Bevon and his seven West Indian sailors who are out under bond will probably be given a hearing before United States Commissioner Money at Biloxi, Miss., on a charge of violating the national prohibition act. It is also said that other charges may result from the case which has created considerable interest in federal officials. A deputy collector of customs accompanied the vessel to Mobile, where it was turned over to Collector Noble.

# Acquitted of Murder, Wins Suit for \$25,000

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 8.—(A. P.)—When they tried C. W. Dorris in superior court here last year for the alleged murder of his wife and his former business associate, Henry D. Meyer, a quarrel over a \$25,000 note signed by Meyer figured prominently in the prosecution's case. But the jury acquitted Dorris, and yet in the superior court he won his suit against Meyer's estate for payment of the \$25,000 less \$800 he admitted he owed Meyer at the time of the shooting.
