

CATHOLICS, JEWS AND NEWSPAPERS SCORED BY KLAN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 10.—(A. P.)—The white robe of the Ku Klux Klan had disappeared today from the streets of the national capital.

With the burning of a monster fiery cross on the Virginia hills last night, the two day gathering of the organization came to a close and visiting klansmen today were on their way home.

The cross, eighty feet high, burned for more than an hour, illuminating the grounds of the Arlington horse show club, where the concluding ceremonies were held for the parade that was featured Saturday by a parade down Pennsylvania avenue.

While the meeting was in progress last night two men who gave their names as G. L. Williams of California, and Morris A. Bermon of Cincinnati, Ohio, were arrested and escorted from the grounds by Arlington county officials for the distribution of anti-klan literature.

Several speeches by klan orators

preceded the initiation of a group of men and women into the organization. The speakers assailed the Catholics, Jews, Scientists and newspapers. The Rev. John E. Gullledge of Columbus, Ohio, charged the newspapers with printing unfair accounts of the klan and its activities.

The Rev. Mr. Gullledge also said that it is agreed with too many religions and lacks the faith of the Lord, Jesus Christ.

Earlier in the day a small group of klansmen placed wreaths of roses on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the grave of William Jennings Bryan.

SAND POINT, Idaho, Aug. 10.—Sherman Bassett, 30, timekeeper for the Humbird Lumber company, and Lillie Olson, 30, school teacher, both of Sand Point, were drowned in the Pend O'Rielle river Saturday night when an automobile carrying six young people plunged off the ferry into 35 feet of water.

C. H. Hatton, Lawrence Berg, Pearl Kagr and Francis Kerr, all of Sand Point, were those rescued.

Messages were sent to Spokane today in an effort to obtain the services of a diver, the belief of the officers here being that the bodies of the drowned are still in the sunken car.

According to the sheriff's office, the party was returning from a day's picnic at lone. When the automobile reached the ferry, Sherman Bassett, who was driving and who, it appears, was none too familiar with the machine, apparently stepped on the gas instead of brake and the machine leaped through the bar at the end of the ferry into the river.
