

2 FOREST FIRES HERE SPREADING, AIRPLANE ARRIVES

A forest fire near Bybee Springs in the Evans Creek district, on the state timberland, the cause of which is attributed to the electrical storm of Saturday night, has not yet been brought under control, and according to late reports is about 1000 acres in area. The Inunaha fire in the Crater National Forest near Prospect has spread from a 40-acre blaze to 200 acres, and also is still beyond control.

The Bybee Springs fire is understood to be burning in an area not thickly timbered, but very brushy. Two more fires less in area are burning in the same locality and are also out of control. All other state fires are out.

Fifty men are fighting the Inunaha blaze, and are meeting stubborn resistance, because of old logs and debris several feet in depth, the remains of a 700-acre forest fire which swept through that section during 1910.

The blaze is nearly a mile wide and is in an old burn, which covers over three square miles. Due to the fact of the depth of the debris no fire trenches can be dug wide enough to keep sparks or blazing snags from jumping the barrier and setting new flames. Forest officials have been planning to use dynamite to stop the flames, but it is believed the fire will burn until it has reached the end of the burn and green timber, at which time it can be easily put under control. The fire-fighters are using two water pumps, utilizing the water of Inunaha creek, which borders one side of the fire, in their efforts to quell the flames.

District State Fire Warden P. B. Lowry is patrolling state timber land this afternoon in a government plane which arrived in noon from Eugene. He will fly above the Bybee Springs fire, it is reported, in order to ascertain how dangerous it is.
