

WINBURN SELLS SAP AND SALT TO CITY OF ASHLAND

"Sap and Salt, palatial summer home up Ashland canyon, in the Ashland creek watershed, owned by Jesse Winburn, prominent New York advertising man, last night was sold to the city by Winburn. The sale price was \$10,000," says the Ashland Tidings.

"The deal for the purchase of Sap and Salt by the city has been pending for about a week. Winburn offering his property to the city for a very nominal sum. The property contains 160 acres of land, and including the improvements, represents an investment of \$40,000.

"The land lies in the Ashland creek watershed, from which creek the city water supply comes. For this reason, it was thought best to purchase the land, those favoring the move pointing out that in case Mr. Winburn sold the property to a private individual, in the future, when it would become absolutely necessary for the city to acquire the land to protect the domestic water supply, the price would be several times that asked at present.

"The sale will be consummated on a time basis, the water fund, from which the money is to come, not having a surplus large enough to cover the entire purchase price. Winburn, this morning declared that he believed there would be no difficulty in arranging terms for the sale."

TWO CONVICTED IN PICKFORD CASE ARE SENTENCED

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 14.—(A. P.)—Superior Judge Victor McLucas today sentenced C. Z. Stephens and Claude Holcomb to terms of from ten years to life in San Quentin prison following their conviction here yesterday of plotting to kidnap Mary Pickford, film star. He denied their motion for probation and a new trial. The defense gave notice of appeal.

A third defendant, Adrian Wood, was acquitted, but did not escape a warning from several jurors who, as they left the courtroom yesterday after returning the verdict told him he "did not realize how close he came," and to be more "careful about his associates in the future."

Neither Miss Pickford nor her husband, Douglas Fairbanks, was present when the defendants heard their fate. Both had testified during the trial that they knew nothing of the kidnaping plot save what detectives told them.

The appearance of Miss Pickford on the witness stand was the high point of the trial and choked four floors of the hall of records with a struggling mob. Only relatives of the accused men were on hand last night to learn what might be their fate.

REGISTERED MAIL SEIZED BY BANDIT

KEWANKEE, Ill., Aug. 13.—(A. P.)—A man about 25 years old today held up a mail messenger who had just received a registered mail pouch from a Chicago, Burlington and Quincy train here and after forcing the messenger to drive his truck several blocks from the station, escaped with the pouch in another machine.

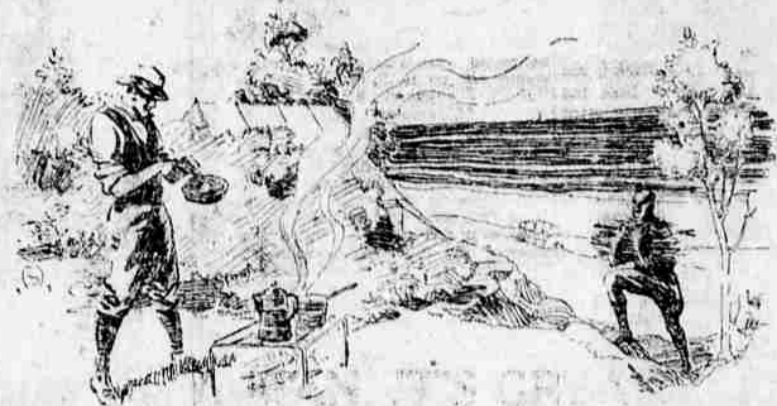
