

## DELINQUENT TAX LAW IS EXPLAINED

SALEM, Aug. 14.—The act of the 1925 legislature providing for the remission by counties of interest, penalty and costs on delinquent taxes of 1921, 1922 and 1923 is interpreted by the attorney-general's office in an opinion written by Deputy Attorney General Hosford.

The act applies to 1921 taxes based on the assessment roll of 1920, the 1922 taxes based on the assessment roll of 1921 and the taxes of 1923 based on the assessment roll of 1922.

It is held that for the act to apply to the 1921 taxes the original tax should have been paid not later than May 1, 1921, to secure the legal remission, the 1922 taxes should be paid not later than October 5, 1923, and the 1923 taxes not later than October 5, 1926.

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mountains by following the Deff Creek woods because of the cover afforded, and the logical route it offers. This, they said, was found to be the opinion of woodsmen and hunters with whom they conversed. It would be necessary for the convicts to follow the creek bed in the main because of the density of the skirting brush. The creek bed does not carry a running stream, but only an occasional pool of water, and the nature of the footing is such that to track a man along the creek would be impossible. A fugitive not accustomed to the woods, said the Portland trailers, would follow the highways.

**Pursuit Methods Poor.**

The Portland officers, particularly Capt. Lewis, severely criticized the organization of the chase, declaring that it lacks leadership. Roads and bridges are utterly unguarded, said Lewis, and he and his fellow officers were able

to travel from Portland to Salem at midnight, and from Salem into the wooded district eastward without being accosted by possemen or guards at bridges or any other place.

Warden Dalrymple, keeping in close touch with operations by telephone from his office, yesterday directed the leaders to distribute their men according to their own judgment, but criticized them for keeping, in some instances, an entire posse grouped in one place.

It will be the object of the coroner's inquest to determine, if possible, who of the escaping convicts shot the guards. The testimony of a large number of persons will be necessary. Coroner Rigdon was unable to say this morning just when the inquest would be called. He was quite certain it would not be in the forenoon and thought it might not be until tonight.

**Dalrymple Criticized.**

The object of the governor's investigation will be to determine whether carelessness and lax discipline on the part of the prison administration were responsible for the break. The governor discredits charges made by Oswald West and others that utter inefficiency was shown by Warden Dalrymple. However, he will make an effort to ascertain the facts. At least that was his declared intention yesterday.

The questions most frequently asked are how the convicts were able to make daggers from files, how they secreted the pieces of rope that they spliced together to let them down from the roof, why they were able to step out of the line marching to the dining room, and how they were able to get to the roof and cut a hole in it.

Knives made from files are often found hidden away in the prison under all wardens. That is history. And as for knives and ropes, it is recalled that Harry Tracy and David Merrill had rifles hidden in the prison. Once before the roof was reached in the same way by the same men who got away Wednesday. This was when Jones, Kelly and others cut through the roof by gaining the fourth cell tier during the Johnson Smith regime. They were caught, however, before they got out of the yard.

**Farm House Robbed.**

SALEM, Aug. 14.—Those in charge of the man hunt for Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelly and James Willos, escaped convicts, this morning said that they were reassured that the fugitives are still in the Pratum neighborhood by the report telephoned to the prison that the Melihon farm house, 7 miles south of Silverton, was pillaged during the night.

Mrs. McElheny reported that late in the night she and her husband heard someone enter the house. She says that they lay still in bed and that the prowlers wandered over almost the entire house for nearly half an hour, but did not enter the bedroom. Nothing was taken except, perhaps, a little food, the woman said.

Mrs. McElheny said she could not tell how many men were in the house, but that they made lots of noise and apparently did not care whether anyone heard them or not.

Waiting for a line after the men left the farmhouse, Byron McElheny notified the warden's office at the penitentiary and guards went to the place to investigate.

About half an hour later, Oregon National Guardsmen in the posse from Silverton saw the flash of a light for an instant moving down Beaver Creek canyon, one-half mile from Willard, as if someone had lighted a match. They could tell there was at least one man, and probably two.

The guardsmen opened fire with their rifles, but the suspects escaped. The various posse this morning were closely guarding an area of country the boundary of which covers about 20 miles and takes in Willard, Sublimity (11 miles south of Silverton), Shaw, thence back to Willard.

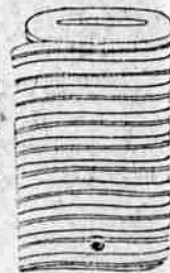

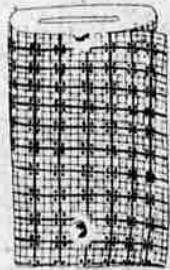
