According to John Beeson, Allen and Sams of Ashland, and Fish and Brown of Medford were the most skillful players of the meet. He also states that the game between Brown and Sams, which decided the southern Oregon singles championship, was one of the hardest fought of the entire meet. While Brown had to contend with the accurate placing by Sams, Sams had to contend with Brown's smashing drives. Brown, at one time was the champion of Coe college, and both young men are proteges of Beeson.

Compliments upon their sportsmanship states Beeson, are due all the players taking part in the meet. He is also appreciative of the interest of valley people, who came by hundreds to view the different matches.

It is possible to hold a state meet in southern Oregon next year, he states, if more courts are available in Medford, but as it is there are only three of any worth in Ashland and this city combined. Two courts which he recently built on West 3rd street, are being dismantled, however if more courts, are to be built to take care of a possible state meet, he feels capable of building same as he claims to have built 61 during the past 15 years.

Tomorrow afternoon at 3:30, the new southern Oregon tennis singles champion, Sams of Ashland, will meet Beeson at the Lithia Park tournament to decide whether or not he can merit the title, as Beeson has been the champion of southern Oregon for many years.

FORD COMPANY CHARGED WITH PATENT THEFT

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 15.—(A. P.)—The Ford Motor company is infringing on patents for automobile transmission bands, Park and Behne, Inc., of St. Louis declare in a bill of complaint filed in the United States district court. The latter conceals an injunction and an accounting of profits it lost and damages suffered as a result of the alleged infringement.

The plaintiff says that in 1916 Thomas Lockewite, of Idaho City, Idaho, invented improvements on transmission bands and was granted two patents which later passed under control of the local company, engaged in the manufacture and sale of automobile parts.

The petition states the invention met with popular approval and there was a heavy demand for the bands. The Ford concern is specifically charged with knowing they contrived to deprive the St. Louis firm of the profits which would accrue to it under the invention by unlawfully manufacturing and selling transmission bands containing principles of the invention.

DEADLOCK IN MAN HUNT.

"Oregon" Jones, were killed, was begun here last night at the office of Coroner Lloyd T. Rigdon. After establishing the identity of the dead men and the manner and cause of their deaths the inquest was adjourned until Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

James W. Lewis, former warden of the state prison and now a Marion county deputy sheriff, formally identified Sweeney, whom he had known for 30 years. Edwin Jacobson of Portland identified Holman. He was Holman's brother-in-law. Doc Jones of Portland, a brother of the dead desperado, identified "Oregon" Jones.

Dr. W. Carlton Smith described the wounds received by the two guards and Dr. G. E. Prime those received by Jones.

Run Down Chas.

SILVERTON, Ore., Aug. 15.—(A. P.)—Possession seeking Tom Murray, Ellsworth Kelly and James Willos, convicts who escaped from the Oregon penitentiary at Salem Wednesday night today were still running down reports of suspects seen at various places, while a strong cordon was guarding a canyon near here in which officers believe the fugitives took refuge.

One posse went to the ranch home of Mrs. Roy King and daughter, midway between Victor Point and Union Hill, where the women reported they had seen two men run through their garden. No trace of the fugitives was found.

An hour later shooting was heard in this vicinity, but investigators failed to determine its cause.

Officers directing the hunt attach little importance, so far as Murray, Kelly and Willos are concerned, to a report from Klamath Falls that three men with revolvers had commandeered an automobile there and forced the driver to start northward.

Deputy Sheriff Hosking of Union Hill county, one of the captors of Owens and Hart who murdered Sheriff Til Taylor, has joined the posse here. He was also one of the original captors of James Willos and believes the latter will desert Murray and Kelly at the first opportunity to do it alone.

WILLOS A CRACK SHOT.

Willos, said Hosking, was formerly an expert rifle shot for an internationally known gun manufacturer and was also champion workman of Colorado, and would be a dangerous man to face in battle, as he is armed with a rifle.

The mystery woman who tried to arrange with officers at Prichard, Salem and Silverton to take part in the search for the outlaws, had departed today, after walking eight miles yesterday in an effort to join a posse.

She told some possession she would return to Portland and others that she would walk to California. She is about 45 or 50 years old. At a hotel she registered as Mrs. Olive Hogan Bloom.

She said her only object was to save lives, especially those of the poor prisoners.

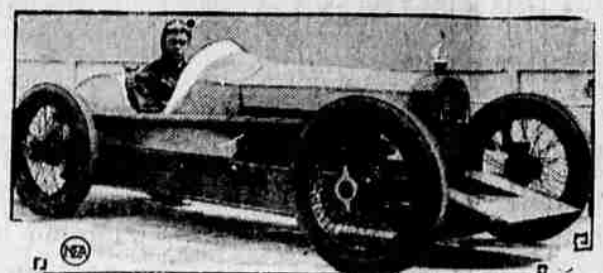

CITY OF ORENCO DENIES CHARGES BOND INFLATION

PORTLAND, Aug. 15.—City officials of Orenco in a statement published here today, take issue with charges which have been published concerning the financing of their city. The statement declares that all bonds issued by the city were duly authorized.

"Stanley Myers, district attorney of Multnomah county, admitted yesterday in the presence of Commissioners Parsons and Meier and City Attorney Schulderman, of Orenco, that he had been misinformed as to the amount of city bonds printed and outstanding.

"Since broadcasting the alarming news that three printing houses in Portland were understood to have printed \$398,000 worth of more of Orenco bonds, the investigators have been unable to substantiate their claims," said the statement.

"The City of Orenco has bonds outstanding only to the amount of \$64,000. Ample provision has been made for the payment of interest and the retirement of all of the bonds of the city. There has not been printed or issued \$1,050,000 of bonds as the alarmed investigators erroneously published in the papers, the total amount issued since June 15, 1925, being but \$60,000."

The statement also declares: "As to the value of the security behind the outstanding bonds of the city, it will be interesting to know that just a part of the property within the city has been valued by competent and reliable appraisers (Messrs. Henry E. Reed and Whitney L. Rose), of Portland, Ore., at approximately \$250,000."

VANCOUVER, Wash., Aug. 15.—First dress rehearsal of the pageant, "The Coming of the White Man," was held last night at the old Fort Vancouver centennial grounds by the company of 319 and the chorus of 130. The celebration opens Monday and continues a week.

The pageant, written by Dr. Francis LaViolette and Dwight Parish, director, consists of three episodes. The first deals with Dr. John McLoughlin's arrival in 1825 and the establishment of Fort Vancouver as the first settlement in the state of Washington. The second depicts the arrival of the United States troops under Lieutenant Phil Sheridan and the transfer of the post from British to American rule.
