FLAZA MARKET IN ASHLAND IS SOLD TO TALENT MAN

ASHLAND, Aug. 17.—(Special.)—The Plaza market for the past five years owned and operated by H. A. Stearns, has been sold to Thomas Hill of Talent, who formerly owned the business, but who has more recently operated the Hill Mercantile company business in Talent, which he sold some time ago to the Brown Mercantile people. Hill has been in business for a number of years in this part of Ashland, operating a number of grocery stores, and has a wide acquaintance in the city. He plans to run the store on a strictly cash basis. He will have associated with him his son, Glenn Hill, who is also an experienced grocery man. CHILD WELFARE CONFERENCE IN ASHLAND, AUG. 20

ASHLAND, Aug. 16.—(Special.)—August 20 is the date set for the third Ashland Child Welfare conference which will be held in the Civic club house from 1:30 p. m. to 5 p. m. of that date, under the supervision of the Jackson County Health unit, in cooperation with the Jackson County Public Health association.

Dr. V. S. Geary, county health officer, will examine the babies, assisted by Miss Vera Beard, public health nurse, and Miss Josephine Koppes, office assistant. This examination includes the weighing and measuring, dental, eye, ear, nose, throat, heart, lungs and body examination. Children up to six years may be entered. Miss Blanche Hicks, librarian, will make appointments. Ashland members of the Jackson County Public Health association will assist with the records. Literature will be distributed at this time. Dr. Geary states that the permanent child welfare clinic is a decided success, judging by the requests for appointments. This permanent clinic was the fourth of its kind to be established in Oregon and Jackson county parents are taking advantage of it.

MEDFORD BEATEN BY EUGENE GOLF TEAM 22 TO 10

Local Golfers, However, Make Better Showing Than Eugene a Week Ago—Egan in Great Form, Leads Field—Buhrman and Tummy Win.

EUGENE, Ore., Aug. 17.—By defeating Medford 22 to 10, here yesterday, Eugene Golf and Country club members evened the count with the southern Oregon team. The first match, played at Medford a week ago, was won by the players of that city, 25 to 6.

H. Chandler Egan of Medford turned in the low score of the day, shooting the 18 holes in 76. E. O. Immel of Eugene was next best, with an 81.

Egan was the only member of the Medford team to make a clean sweep of three points in his match. He defeated Bert Prescott of Eugene.

Three Eugene men, Immel, Dr. J. M. Miller and Wallace Wintler turned in full scores of three points. Immel won from Johnson, Miller from Biddle and Wintler defeated Clarke.

The deciding match will be played in the near future at Medford, at a date to be announced later. The next Eugene match will be at Marshfield, August 30, when a twenty-man team and a ladies team is expected to invade the Coos country.

Eugene has a beautiful 18-hole course, slightly rolling and winding through tall shade trees. Only nine holes are open to play at this time, but the entire eighteen holes will be thrown open during the coming month and Eugene will then take pride in possessing one of the finest golf courses on the Pacific coast, to which more than three hundred of her prominent citizens have contributed. HELEN WILLS IS HURT BY BOOBS, BUT PLAYS ON

NEW YORK, Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—The tennis crown of Miss Helen Wills of Berkeley, Calif., is at stake in the annual women's national tournament beginning at Forest Hills this afternoon and ending Saturday.

Miss Wills is defending the championship, which she has held two years and it is sought by 63 other stars, including the English players, who defeated America's best in team play at Forest Hills last week.

The champion was hurt by the boos of the crowd at Forest Hills on Saturday when she appeared ten minutes late for her doubles play in the international contests. She now explains that the delay was caused by orders of her team captain and officials. She had arrangements had been made for her to receive a message which she could gladly have gone without were it not for the insistence of the tennis committee.

"I was surprised and hurt when I went on the court and heard the spectators, but I couldn't do anything about it but just play the best I could," he said. "I'm trying to forget their jeers now, at least I'll never be late again."

Today's 22 matches begin at 3 p. m. daylight time. Miss Wills plays Mrs. Felene Pollak Falk of New York at 4 p. m.

SEES DEATH KNELL FOR IRISH DOCTORS

DUBLIN, Aug. 17.—The death knell of the medical profession in the Irish Free State has been sounded, in the opinion of many doctors here by an announcement of the government's intention to establish a separate and independent medical register and to cut loose from the British general medical council.

The general result of the decision which is to become effective next February will be that doctors qualifying in the Free State will be unable to practice in Great Britain or northern Ireland, while physicians from those places will be barred from southern Ireland.
