

# BELGIAN PAPERS FLAY AMERICA ON DEBT STAND

BRUSSELS, Aug. 18.—Anger and bitterness continue to mark the comments of the Belgian press on the conference at Washington between the American war debt funding commission and the Belgian mission.

The optimistic tone of semi-official statements made in Brussels before the conference, which encouraged the hope that favorable conditions would be made for the payment of Belgium's debt to the United States, is resented as having misled public opinion.

The Nation belge says that promises have been broken and that President Wilson's signature has become a scrap of paper.

The Midi says that America's attitude in regard to the debt question is cynical and that President Coolidge is in the hands of Wall street.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(A. P.)—Bearing out the optimistic feeling of President Coolidge that solution of the Belgian debt problem is near, it developed today that the Belgian negotiators had made reservations to sail from New York Saturday on the liner Majestic.

The Belgians, as well as officials here involved in the negotiations were reticent in regard to possible terms of the settlement. Even announcement of the intention of the negotiators to return home was withheld, but it was learned that the reservations were made before the departure of Secretary Mellon and Senator Smoot for Vermont to consult with the president.

Six Year Old Swimming Star. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 18.—(A. P.)—Six year old John Devine yesterday swam the Delaware river below Philadelphia in 45 minutes.
