

HOOT OWLS FACE GOVERNMENT SUIT BY INDIANA ORDER

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 19.—The home nest of the Order of Owls, in South Bend, Ind., has appealed to the government through the local federal court, for a hearing to determine whether the Keep Growing Wiser Order of Hoot Owls, radio fun-makers, shall be permitted to keep the word "owls" in its name. The complaint, filed today, recites in detail its reasons for believing that "the light and frivolous character of the Keep Growing Wiser Order of Hoot Owls is injurious to the original Fraternal and Benevolent Order of Owls, and creates confusion in the minds of the public."

Forced to Drink Poison, Woman Dies In Florida Jail

MIAMI, Fla., Aug. 19.—(A. P.)—John Goebel, wealthy Daytona real estate operator; Frank Goebel, his brother, and W. B. Hanley were placed in jail here today in connection with the death of Mrs. H. B. Hunt, 22. The woman had been arrested by private detectives whom John Goebel had employed to recover a \$1,500 diamond ring. Sheriff's deputies said that after John Goebel visited her cell last night she rushed into the jail office crying that he had forced her to drink something. She died today.

More Suspects Reported

TACOMA, Aug. 19.—(A. P.)—Tacoma police officers early today were notified that three men believed to be the trio who escaped from the Oregon prison last Wednesday night, had fixed on a truck ten miles north of Centralia at midnight. The report came from peace officers at Chehalis who stated that Charles Taylor, a truck driver for a Payalup transportation firm, noticed an automobile roadster standing near an oil station while he was going to Chehalis. As he slowed down out of curiosity he obtained a good view of the three men, he stated, and declared that they closely resembled newspaper photographs of the escaped convicts. All were unshaven, he asserted. Apparently believing the truck was stopping, one of the trio fired at the driver, the bullet penetrating the windshield and passing close to Taylor. As Taylor speeded up at this hint he looked back and saw the roadster get under way, heading north.

SEATTLE, Aug. 19.—(A. P.)—The three escaped slayers from the Oregon penitentiary, Tom Murray, Ellisworth Kelly and James Willos, are headed for this vicinity and plan to visit the parents of Murray, who live on Bainbridge Island in Puget Sound, west of Seattle, was the belief expressed by police here tonight. All roads to Seattle were heavily guarded and sheriff's deputies went to Bainbridge Island to be in readiness to close in on the convicts should they appear.

BENDLETON, Ore., Aug. 19.—Three men, claimed to closely resemble Murray, Willos and Kelly, accompanied by a woman, were seen in Umatilla, last night, according to reports reaching here. A store was reported robbed during the night at Irigon, near Umatilla. The sheriff's office is working on the case and fingerprints found will be examined.

ENEMY OF SLAIN NEWSPAPER MAN. KELSO, ARRESTED

KELSO, Wash., Aug. 19.—A. H. Gordon, ex-superintendent of the Kelso water department, last night admitted following his arrest, officers say, to embezzling \$1200 of water department funds. Following his arrest Gordon was questioned by Fred Chestnut, head of the state department of municipal corporations and R. G. Sharp, assistant attorney general. Luke S. May, in charge of the investigation of the Dorey murder, also was present as were the sheriff and the prosecuting attorney. Gordon denied having anything to do with the murder of Thomas Dorey, Kelso editor, here on June 9. Dorey in his newspaper, had demanded an investigation of Gordon's accounts and the two were both prominent in the fight that led to the recall of Mayor Todd. Gordon has a wife and four children. He had been employed in the water department for sixteen years and had been the superintendent for three years.

(Continued From Page One) told him it was still going on. He told his fist down on the table and shouted that he would see that it was stopped. "Was it stopped then?" "No." Bryan said that when he complained to Warden Dalrymple of the gambling the warden answered: "How in hell can I stop it?" The gambling games consist mostly of poker, Bryan and C. E. Charlton, former principal keeper, explained. Rev. Bryan also declared that the smoking of marijuana (flower of the hemp plant) is extensive among the convicts. The drug, he said, is obtained from the hemp hauled into the prison yard. "It is worse than opium," he said. He said the discipline is very lax as compared to that which existed when he first became prison chaplain. Justifying as to the discipline maintained at the prison, Guard Murphy declared that "from my point of view there is no such a thing as discipline." Murphy has been a guard at the prison under five different administrations. "The convicts are running the institution and are gaining ground constantly," said Murphy.

Oil Tender Burned to Death

LEWISTOWN, Mont., Aug. 19.—(A. P.)—Jack Courth, a still tender at the oil refining plant of the Lewis-Town Oil & Refining company plant here, was burned to death and a considerable amount of oil destroyed in a fire which broke out in the still this afternoon. The loss has not been ascertained.

Two upsets marked today's play when Miss Anderson, Richmond, Va., girl, defeated Miss Evelyn Colyer of England, 7-5, 7-5, while Miss Fry came from behind to defeat Miss Mary K. Browne, No. 2, American ranking star, 2-6, 6-4, 6-2.

It is the intention to hold a national convention of the order in 1937 at Yakima.

(Continued From Page One) up by passing boats. Others climbed to the gunwales and attempted to reach the top deck. Helping hands were lowered to aid them in their rush for safety. Boats were lowered when it was thought the craft was going to sink, while life rafts and deck gear were tossed overboard. Many of the victims failed to hear the report and their warning was the swift rush of deadly steam which trapped them. Those who saw the disaster from the shore described a large burst of black smoke which shot from the steamer. This was followed by the steam which enveloped the entire boat. As McVey beached the ship launches sent out by the battleship Wyoming, the scout cruisers Denver and Raleigh, the tender Dobbin and scores of torpedo boat destroyers swarmed about.
