

LOCAL PEARS ARE SOLD IN ENGLAND

According to Guy Connor, local representative of Simons Shuttleworth and French, fruit brokers, the first successful shipment and sale of Medford pears in Europe was made yesterday when a car of Bartletts from the H. Van Housen ranch was sold in Southampton for 29 shillings per box, netting the grower about \$1.84 per box for the naked fruit.

On the same day of this sale Mr. Connor declares the New York auction market for Bartletts was \$2.40, which would have netted the grower only about fifty cents per box for the naked fruit.

WILLIAMS BOY IS IMPROVING

LeRoy Williams, 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Williams of 808 East 2nd street, who suffered a fractured skull Tuesday noon when he fell 27 feet out of a high tree to the ground, is improved, but is not yet out of danger, according to reports from the Sacred Heart Hospital where he is a patient.

According to the father, the boy had grabbed a high tension wire while climbing in the tree. It is believed, to steady himself. After the shock of which had rendered him unconscious he fell to the ground below. The palm of his hand, with which he had held the wire, was badly burned.

It is expected that several days will pass before the boy is completely out of danger.
