U. S. LABOR BUREAU IS A BUSY PLACE, MANY EMPLOYED

During the past ten days 385 men and women have been given employment through the Medford branch of the United States free employment service, according to Chris Gottlieb, who is in charge. Six hundred and thirty people applied for work, besides many so-called hoboes, the count of which was not kept. The greater proportion of the employment given was such as fruit and berry picking, while odd jobs such as teaming, carpentering, general work, and in many cases jobs in local packing sheds, constituted other forms of employment. Many of the applicants are tourists who come to Medford completely out of funds with which to support themselves and families. The office also aids local people in finding work and naturally gives them the preference, while some who apply for employment are bent with age, totally incompetent to do physical labor, the majority are husky young men. Mr. Gottlieb is duly proud of the fact that out of the hundreds he has provided employment, he has never received one complaint regarding their services. The rush of the day usually occurs in the morning, at which time men line before the Chamber of Commerce building waiting for the office to open. Often 15 or 20 are in his office at the same time, and those who are deserving are in most cases served.
