MOTOR CAR THIEF FAKES ILLNESS TO GAIN TIME

An attempt to fake a severe illness did not benefit Elms Warner, 21, who is held at Ashland by authorities for an alleged automobile theft, when he went through paroxysms of pain last night at Ashland's city jail.

When first "attacked" he called for a surgical operation before 3 o'clock that evening. District Attorney Newton Chaney, when he had been informed of Warner's actions, instructed Dr. A. Gray, county health officer, to give the man a thorough diagnosis and to operate if necessary.

After an examination the doctor declared the lad was perfectly healthy, save for a slight bilious attack. Warner's pulse was normal.

Authorities attribute the faked illness to Warner's probable belief that it would be much easier to gain his freedom from a hospital than from a jail.

The two boys are Canadians and it is believed they entered the country by illegal methods. If the report is verified they will probably be subject to deportation. Here a man, Elms' brother, is a prisoner at the county jail at Jacksonville, both having been arrested Saturday night by State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon and C. P. Talent near the town of Talent.
