

U. S. A. IS LOSING A HUGE HUN ON EUROPEAN DEBTS

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 25.—(A. P.)—Martin B. Madden of Chicago, chairman of the appropriations committee of the house of representatives, today predicted that the nations of Europe which are indebted to the United States will pay their debts in full.

Mr. Madden is in Portland to address the Western States Taxpayers' conference in session here. "Every country in Europe that owes us will pay in full—they've got to pay us," he declared. "But as regarding interest on that debt, there's another question. In funding these debts we are allowing the debtors to pay us 3 per cent for the first ten years and 3 1/2 after that, while our government is paying from 4 to 4 1/2 per cent on this money."

LARGE PORTION OF LAWSON FORTUNE GOES TO CHARITY

CHICAGO, Aug. 25.—(A. P.)—Virtually three-fourths of the estate of the late Victor F. Lawson, noted editor and owner of the Chicago Daily News, was left to benevolent purposes. The newspaper and other property was left to the management of the Illinois Merchants Trust company, as trustee.
