

### LIST OF BOOKS IN LOCAL SCHOOLS IS MADE PUBLIC

The list of books and supplies by grades that will be used in the Medford elementary schools this year was given out today by Superintendent E. H. Hedrick.

A supply of books is now on hand at the Haskins' drug store, the local depository, and pupils are being urged to purchase early and avoid the usual rush of the last few days. Books should not be damaged or marked in any way until after pupils are actually registered and classified.

Those who do not purchase books early will be asked to conform to the following schedule in procuring them:

Grades one to four, inclusive—Thursday, September 3.

Grades five to eight, inclusive—Friday, September 4.

High school pupils may purchase their books on Tuesday, September 8, following registration.

In the elementary grades the pupils are not being asked to purchase text books at this time. Also, it will be noted that Oregon history is a subject given in both the sixth B and eighth B grades this year. This was made necessary by a shifting of that subject from the eighth to the sixth grade in the new state course of study. The list of books follows:

### TRUCK DRIVER IS SENT TO JAIL, 9 SPEEDERS FINED

Ten more traffic violation cases have come before Judge Glenn O. Taylor during the past two days. Out of the ten, one offender received a sentence of 10 days in the county jail, while the fines for others ranged from \$20 to \$25 each.

On his plea of guilty to reckless driving, Cameron Moore, local truck driver, received the 10 day jail sentence. His driver's license could not be suspended, as that had been done last May when he pleaded guilty to a charge of speeding, on which he was also fined. Moore will not be able to regain possession of the suspended license until he has paid a balance still due on the fine. State Traffic Officer J. J. McMahon was the complaining officer.

A reckless driving charge was also placed against H. A. Phillips of Wood, Cal., by the same officer as a result of Phillips' inability to run a car in Sunday afternoon traffic at the intersection of Riverside avenue and Main street, thereby endangering the lives of several pedestrians on the sidewalk when he nearly ran into the Sparta building. Phillips, who is declared incompetent to operate an automobile, faced the prospect of a jail sentence or a \$25 fine, the latter if he disposed of his car, a Ford bug and by doing the latter escaped imprisonment.

Others who received fines on charges filed by McMahon, include George A. Yocum of Los Angeles, \$10 for speeding; M. M. Bowman of Los Angeles, \$10 for operating a motor vehicle with improper license plates; P. K. Bulfinch, another Californian visiting here, \$20 for speeding; Eddie Nyberg, a fruit peddler near Ashland, \$15 for speeding a truck; O. Garber, California, \$75 for speeding and Arthur Burrell, Los Angeles, \$10 on a similar charge.

This forenoon in Judge Taylor's court, Mervyn C. Gleason, barber, was fined \$10 for speeding a motorcycle on North Central. This was his second offense during the past summer. Howard Meadows, a local man, was also fined \$15 for speeding on North Central. State Traffic Officer C. P. Talbot filed the complaint.

### RADICAL CHANGES ARE MADE IN APPEARANCE OF NEW FORD CAR

DETROIT, Aug. 26.—(A. P.)—The most pronounced changes in the Ford motor car since the Ford Motor company began production of the model T, the standard Ford chassis, was announced by the company today. There is no change in price.

Both open and closed cars have an all steel body on a lower chassis with changed body style in nearly all models.
