KID KAPLAN IS STILL CHAMPION BY FAST FINISH

WATERBURY, Conn., Aug. 28.—Louis (Kid) Kaplan of Meriden, Conn., retains the featherweight boxing championship of the world, having fought a draw in his 15-round contest with the former Californian, Babe Herman, before 20,000 persons at Brasco park last night. Several experts were inclined to favor Herman, who showed better generalship, but a whitewind finish had much to do with the referee's decision. After the contest an examination revealed that Kaplan had suffered a broken finger in the eighth round. Kaplan said that after the eighth he had been able to use his right hand only as a guard.

In this sixth meeting between the two men there was clinching and dancing and few clean punches were landed. Herman fought his usual stand up battle, while Kaplan had little of the driving power he showed in fighting his way through to the championship by the state athletic commission tournament route.

In his contests of the tournament he stopped the savior, Bobby Garcia, by a lightning attack in the final round, and knocked out Donny Kramer of Philadelphia for the championship. In their six meetings, Kaplan and Herman have each won a bout and four have been declared draws. Herman was an alternate in the championship.

Last night's combat was staged after a seething afternoon in which Kaplan managed to secure the 125 pounds, which is the limit for his weight. Police had to be called before the weighing had been completed. Herman's manager claiming the title, because, as he said, the champion was over the limit. Representatives of the Connecticut boxing body, however, ended the argument by declaring that Kaplan had made the weight.

Referee Explains Decision.
 Referee Jack Sheehan today gave the following summary of the Kaplan-Herman bout and his reason for declaring it a draw:

"The bout was of a wavering kind. It saw-sawed back and forth, often frequently.

"Kaplan took the first four rounds by force in carrying in and by sharp body attack.

"Herman took the next three rounds, running into favor by defensive fighting and his meeting Kaplan with a long, rasping left hand.

"But after this the battle saw-sawed until the 12th round, when Herman came to life with a hurricane attack which cast gloom over the army of Nutmeg state adherents by the force of his blows.

"From then on it was anybody's bout, and so on to the end.

"I think my decision met with approval. It was a matter of one man playing for the head and the other scoring to the body. I believe it was a draw—a good draw.

"I didn't know I was to referee this bout until five minutes before. I have had a referee's license in Connecticut for a long time."

Mr. Sheehan said he had come to the boxing meet to see the main bout without the least idea that he would be asked to appear in it.

The earnings of the boxers were announced as follows:
 Kaplan, \$12,625, or about 40 per cent

of the net receipts, and of Herman, \$9842, or about 29 per cent.
 The gross receipts were \$59,180.50 and the net \$49,300. The paid admissions were given as 12,900.

LEADING TEAMS AMERICAN LEAGUE CONTINUE TO LOSE

NEW YORK, Aug. 28.—(A. P.)—Losing streaks are keeping Washington and Philadelphia locked in the race for the American league leadership and today the world champion Senators boast a margin of one point.

The redoubtable Walter Johnson, recalled hurriedly from his home in Kansas to take the mound at St. Louis, failed yesterday before Joe Bush's greatest performance of the season. The former Yankee permitted only one hit, that a double by Johnson, and won, five to nothing. It was the fourth straight defeat for the youthful Stanley Harris.

The Athletics meanwhile benefited while breaking their string of defeats by conquering an Akron team in an exhibition game, 10 to 6.

Aldrich of Pittsburg, leading team in the National and Benton of the Braves, engaged in a super-rustle at Boston which went to the Pirates, 1 to 0, when Benton filled the bases with two walks and a scratch hit by Rawlings, then forced a man across with another pass.

The Giants lost to Cincinnati, 3 to 2 in a desperate struggle, Pittsburg stretching its advantage to six and a half games.

Brooklyn gained a firm hold on fourth place by downing the Cardinals, 10 to 5 after Dick Cox had smashed a homer into the stands to tie the score in the ninth. Hornsby made his 34th circuit clout of the season.

Carlson of the Phillies shut out the Cubs, 4 to 0, although his mates made only five hits off Blake. Lyons, right-hand White Sox ace, annexed his eighteenth victory of the season by trouncing the powerless Yankees at Chicago, 6 to 5.

A triple by Tavenner and a wild throw by Rotrock in the tenth gave Detroit a five to four decision over Boston in ten innings.
