A party left Medford in three cars, a. m., and after short stops at Peet and other points, reached lake at 12:30, where they were and welcomed by Superintendent Mason, who gave Congressman Madden a brief history of the lake. Lunch was at the lodge, Paul E. Kees paid a high compliment to Madden's service in congress and expressed the pleasure of the entire party of having Mr. Madden with them, and will be to assist in every way possible.
