TREASURE HUNT IN JACKSONVILLE STIRS PIONEERS

A treasure hunt that has been going on for the last 18 months on a knoll on the Alice Hanley and W. H. Gore ranches, west of the city is ended, and a hole about the size of the iron box used to carry gold dust and money in pioneer days is left as a monument to the success of the mysterious digger, whose identity and the amount of his spoils are unknown.

In early days, the region was a popular haunt of bad men, the road being used by Wells-Fargo express coaches, and gold pack trains from the rich Willow Springs district. In one stage robbery in the region, the loot was buried beneath an old oak tree. The money and gold dust was recovered, and the tree was cut down and in the recent excavating, the stump of the oak tree was used as a base for measuring operations.

While there is much of conjecture in the object of the treasure hunter, the hole-marked condition of the knoll indicated the searcher thought he was after something.

The knoll was well searched, each hole being about three feet deep. The soil is sticky and hard, in the later days of the search, a crowbar was used to locate the object of the hunt, and before the leaves started to fall and the last rain, there was an abundance of crowbar holes. During the past month the operations ceased.

The work was always conducted on moonlight nights and while the Gore and Hanley families, noticed the digger they thought nothing of it, but were struck by his persistence. Four or five holes were dug every night. Attempts to visit him, while at work proved fruitless. In the neighborhood of 150 holes, all about the same size were dug, not to mention many crowbar holes.

At one time it was considered by Miss Hanley to plow up the knoll with a high-powered tractor, and also engage in the hunt.

In the opinion of those who have visited the knoll, and are familiar with the unusual situation, John Doe, either had a mania for digging holes or had inside information on the burial place of a strong box. It is also figured that two men were interested; that one watched the roads while the other handled a pick shovel and crowbar.

The first robbery occurred about 20 years ago, at that time Jacksonville was a rich mining town, and this region was infested by a number of "hole hunters" not adverse to stage robbing and similar crimes.

The recent events will probably refresh pioneer memories on "daring deeds" that started legends.
