PIG EXHIBIT FEATURE OF 1925 COUNTY FAIR

Pigs with pedigrees a yard long, which rank with the best in the swine world, will wobble around and show for the edification of fair visitors. There will be keen competition for the liberal premium money offered by the far, and the judges will award a "fat chance" of making their hawks without a lot of "squeals."

Every swine breeder in this section is being urged to enter the animals in the coming show by Superintendent Earl Newby who is handling the details for the swine department. Premium lists and entry blanks, giving complete information about the show, have been sent out to every known breeder in these parts.

The need for greater diversification in livestock raising as well as farm products, is being stressed by fair officials this year. Every farmer is being urged to add a few brood sows to his livestock holdings. Breeders who are assisting the fair management in

MAN WHO CAUGHT ROY GARDNER IS VISITOR IN CITY

Louis Sonney, an ex-policeman of Centralia, Wash., who sprang into the limelight, headlines and movies, three years ago by a single-handed capture of Roy Gardner, when that picture-quest bandit escaped from officers enroute to prison from Portland, arrived by auto in the city Wednesday. Sonney is accompanied by Montana Jack, a cowboy. They will appear this afternoon and evening at the Hiato theater. Films, showing Roy Gardner, and various phases of his life, will be presented, and Sonney will lecture on his relations with the gentleman now serving 75 years at Leavenworth, Kansas, for his activities against the mails and the contents thereof.

According to Sonney, he has traveled through 26 states, and is rendering financial aid towards Gardner securing an operation on his head, a delicacy in the same being held responsible for his behavior. If this is a success, Gardner expects to be out and about before he has served 75 years. A percentage of the proceeds are turned over to Mrs. Gardner and the incarcerated bandit.

Sonney captured Gardner, after he had escaped from federal officers while on a train enroute to McNell's Island federal prison. He found Gardner in a Centralia hotel. At the time, Gardner was posing as a logger who had met with an accident, and had his face wrapped in bandages, to escape recognition. Sonney received a large reward, half of which he gave to Mrs. Gardner.

As a result of the capture, Sonney and Gardner became good friends, and now write letters to each other.

According to Sonney, Gardner passed through Medford three times during his four escapes. On the last one, he was shaved by Henry G. Bates, the fugitive giving the tonorial artist a dollar for the job. Ten days later Gardner was captured while attempting to rob a mail car in Arizona.
