ATHLETICS DAZED BY DEFEATS MAY LOSE 2ND PLACE

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—(A. P.)—From a sprint for the championship, the American league pennant race within two weeks has turned into a triumphant Washington march. The dazed Athletics now trail in the dust of twelve straight defeats, nine full games behind the leaders. Mack's team on its home field yesterday lost to Washington twice, 2 to 1 and 7 to 6.

The Pirates, riding in front of the Giants with a lead of 8 and a half games, maintained their advantage by splitting with the Cubs. The Corsairs outbatted their foes in a morning hit fest, 8 to 5, a total of 32 safeties being amassed by the two clubs, but in the afternoon the Cubs made 16 more hits and won, 9 to 8.

The Tigers obtained a toe-hold on fourth place in the American league by clawing the Browns, 7 to 6, in the morning brush, but Slater's club in the afternoon drove them back into the second division again after 11 innings, 4 to 3. Defeat snapped Detroit's string of straight victories.

The White Sox and Cleveland also halved their double-header. Jim Edwards blanked the Speaker entry in the final contest with four hits, 5 to 6, after a Cleveland rally in the ninth had decided the opening clash by 6 to 5.

Rain reduced the Red Sox-Yankees bill at the Hub to a single conflict, in which Babe Ruth, suspended and fined \$5000 during the New York club's road trip, was re-instated. Babe fanned twice and made one error in the field, but he got one of the Yankees' five hits off Ehlers, who hurled the Hub men to a 5-triumph.

Double-headers between the Giants and Braves and the Robins and Phillies in the National were washed out by rain. St. Louis held its own in a three-cornered fight with Brooklyn and Boston for fourth place by trouncing Cincinnati, 6 to 1, after taking the short end of a morning exchange, 8 to 6. Hornsby made his 34th homer.

COQUILLE WINS TRAPSHOOT MEET

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 6.—L. E. Simmons of Eugene was high point man in the second annual trapshoot held here Sunday and yesterday by the Lane County Sportsmen's association with a total of 429 out of 450 targets.

Ray Glass of Eugene was second high man in the Class A competition with a score of 292. Simmons made 423 in that event.

Ed Graham of Coquille won the handicap shoot with a score of 48 in a 50 bird event. Dr. A. K. Downs of Portland tied him in the handicap, but lost in the shoot-off.

After a double tie, the Coquille team defeated Eugene in the team shoot Sunday. The Portland team was third in the event.

HELEN WILLS INVINCIBLE

BERKELEY, Cal., Sept. 8.—Helen Wills displayed the strokes yesterday which made her national champion for three consecutive victories. Her opponent, Dorothy Stewart, of San Francisco, in the third round of the women's state tennis championship was unable to take a single game.

PASCO BANK IS FORCED TO CLOSE

OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 8.—(A. P.)—Owing to difficulties growing out of poor crop conditions and inability to realize upon frozen assets, officials of the State Bank of Pasco today turned over the bank to the division of banking for liquidation. Supervisor of Banking Harry C. Johnson informed the Associated Press over the long distance telephone this morning from Pasco. Deposit liability amounts to approximately \$280,000. Supervisor Johnson said. The bank was organized in April, 1908, and the capital stock was listed at \$50,000 with \$10,000 surplus at the time of the last call statement.

"Great credit is due J. B. Crain, president of the bank, for his untiring efforts and for the fact that his personal fortune has been exhausted in an attempt to save the institution," Supervisor Johnson declared.

EX-CHICAGO STAR TO COACH EUGENE

EUGENE, Ore., Sept. 8.—Dr. William Stegman, a former captain and tackle on the University of Chicago football team, will be assistant line coach at the University of Oregon, according to announcement of Virgil Earl, director of athletics. Dr. Stegman will report to Coach Dick Smith when the season opens.

Dr. Stegman learned his football under Stagg's tutelage.

At the close of the football season he will become a member of the university health staff. He is a graduate of Rush Medical college as well as Chicago.

Dr. Stegman had coaching experience before entering Rush. He will assist Baz Williams in coaching the Oregon linemen.

NEW RECORD AT PIKE'S PEAK

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo., Sept. 7.—(A. P.)—Charles Meyers of Colorado Springs, won the annual Pike's Peak hill climb here today driving his automobile over the course of 12 miles, 2200 feet, to the summit of the mountain in 17 minutes, 48 4-5 seconds, establishing a new record.

SENATORS EXPRESS SYMPATHY WITH KLAMATH RANCHERS

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Sept. 8.—If possible relief will be granted Klamath sheepmen, according to United States Senator Stanfield, who with Senator Cameron of Arizona, held a grazing hearing of the senate public lands committee here yesterday.

The wool growers asked that more land be thrown open, and that land formerly allotted to cattle be given over to the grazing of sheep. They likewise asked that more wells be provided on the public lands.

The senate committee expressed itself as being in sympathy with the plea of Klamath sheep growers and held out strong hope that their demands would be granted.

A short hearing relative to a federal building for Klamath Falls did not develop any material encouragement from the two committee members. They indicated that the time is not yet ripe to put forward a campaign for such a building.

The 190 senators were guests at an informal and hurriedly arranged luncheon yesterday noon.

DRUNKEN DRIVER HELD FOR CRASH, WIFE, SON HURT

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 7.—Jacob Dietz carrying a driver's license card revoked for a year in June, 1924, by Judge Eckwall of Portland, is in the county jail here charged with driving while intoxicated. His little son is in a hospital at Newberg with a fractured skull, and his wife is suffering from severe contusions about the head and two front teeth missing, while Dietz's car is a wreck and a big truck is in the ditch near St. Paul, this county. It is charged that Dietz drove head on into the truck yesterday morning.

The truck was carrying a heavy load of beer, and when the truck was in the ditch the gate to the truck was opened and the steers escaped, according to report brought in by officers.

Dietz's home is given on his driver's license as 769 East Eighth street, Portland, although he told officers he lived on Route 1, at box 223 out of Oregon City.

The truck which was ditched was driven by Nick Gurin, Portland, and is owned by L. Flora, Portland.

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OFFICIALS FAVOR LIFE TERM FOR MANIAC SLAYER

MONTCLAIR, N. J., Sept. 8.—(A. P.)—Harrison W. Noel, 29 years old, former Harvard student and escaped inmate of an insane asylum who kidnaped and killed six-year-old Mary Dap because of "craving for \$4000," in ransom money, is likely to be ordered confined for life, as were the slayers of Bobby Franks in Chicago. Noel pleaded guilty yesterday to the kidnaping. He denied he shot and killed the girl or Raymond Pierce, negro taxi driver to get an automobile for the abduction.

He awaits arraignment on charges of murdering the girl and wounding John Sandin, chauffeur who gave chase after the kidnaping.

Sunday he was treated with boastfulness to all of the crimes.

Captain James A. Mason, head of Essex county detectives, says Noel is "hopelessly" insane. A committee of alienists is to be sought by John A. Bigelow, prosecutor of Essex county, to examine the youth. If found insane he will be committed to the state hospital at Trenton. If he is found sane, his plea of guilty of the kidnaping charge exposes him to a sentence of life imprisonment. There is no lesser sentence for the crime in New Jersey.

While "Jersey justice" has been meted swiftly and surely, it is believed that rather than go through a murder trial with the probability of a fight on insanity, the officials would be content with a kidnaping sentence.

Three persons have narrowly escaped death at Noel's hands, records at the county insane asylum at Overbrook show. Noel attacked his father, asleep in a tent on a camping trip with a Boy Scout hatchet in 1923. Confined in the Craig sanitarium at Beacon, N. Y., he beat an attendant insensible with the arm of a chair.

Last year as a seaman on a trans-Atlantic liner, he tried to kill a cook.

PHANTOM DAGGER MAN IS SOUGHT, 3 GIRL VICTIMS

MONTREAL, Sept. 8.—Police were searching the city today for a "Phantom Dagger Man" who yesterday stabbed three girls, wounding one seriously. One of the victims saw the assailant and two did not realize until some time after being stabbed what had occurred. All three incidents occurred in the same district.

Flora Campbell, 26, was stabbed in the back while out walking and was so seriously hurt that she had to be taken to a hospital.

Cecile Ervin, 15, was stabbed while going to church. She saw no one at the time, she said, but felt a stinging sensation in the middle of her back and after returning home from church found a small knife wound.

Laura Blanchard, 16, said she did not know when she was stabbed although she later discovered three wounds in her back.

SALEM SUICIDE IS IDENTIFIED AT LAST

SALEM, Ore., Sept. 8.—A man who committed suicide here early in August and who had registered at a local hotel as William Sullivan has been identified through a San Francisco bank as William Hannivar of that city. The San Francisco bank has acknowledged receipt of \$525

from Hannivar sent the day before he shot himself on the bank of the Willamette river here. A son from San Francisco is expected to arrive here today or tomorrow. Hannivar was 59 years old and had lived at a local hotel for some time before his death.
