REGISTRATION AT LOCAL SCHOOLS BREAKS RECORD

Following the opening day yesterday of the public schools, the pupils and teachers today settled down to routine work.

The total registration of yesterday comprised 1321 pupils in the grades and 430 students in the high school, a total of 1751, which makes a new record for the city...

There is quite a local shift going on from time to time in the city's population, as is reflected in school records, and according to the latest shift shown in yesterday's registration Superintendent E. H. Hedrick finds he will be able to make some slight changes in transferring pupils to buildings nearer their homes.

For instance the shift in population in the north end of the city because of the increase in the lumber mill district is now greater than in other sections...

Since the Washington school is the center of population, and it is Superintendent Hedrick's aim to keep it filled to capacity, the total registration of yesterday shows that more pupils than had been assigned on the opening day can be handled in that building.
