MR. J. C. OTTINGER BUYS NYE CHICKEN RANCH FOR \$9000

By Mary O. Carey. EDEN PRECINCT, Sept. 11.—Talent makes another important sale, that of the Nye poultry and garden farm. H. B. Nye last week sold to J. C. Ottinger, former owner of Jackson Hot Springs, his small poultry and garden ranch in the south end of town. This is one of the very best little places in the valley and although it contains only three acres or less, it brought \$9000 and is worth every dollar paid by the new owner. Mr. Nye will build new poultry houses on his other place in the northern part of town, and will move into what was formerly the Schidler house, now owned by Mr. Nye.

There are two of the men interested in the building of the new sawmill who have come to Talent to make their home. One of them last Tuesday closed a deal for the Withrow property and moved from the Nye house into his own home. The other partner will still occupy part of the big house owned by Mr. Nye, and part of which the Nye family will also occupy until other arrangements can be made.
