DEER PLENTIFUL, MANY BUCKS ARE BROUGHT TO CITY

While hundreds of sportsmen from Medford and the valley were out in the hills yesterday enjoying the opening of the deer season, not all were fortunate enough to bag meat, but a number of hunters returned to the city last night with dead bucks. The exact amount of venison slaughtered during yesterday will not be known until the rest of the hunters return, but from reports already in it is known that the deer are plentiful this season, more so than last year.

The largest deer killed so far, as was known here this noon was a 141-pound buck which T. B. Lowd, district fire warden, brought down yesterday morning at Butte canyon in the Dead Indian country. Hugo Von Hellen and Floyd Pickle, who hunted with "Heavy" Austin, the mountaineer, as guide in the Dead Indian country, also returned with a fairly large buck, as did Dan Collier, whose companion was a good shot. The latter two hunted in the Pleasant creek section.

Mr. Collier, who is quite truthful on occasions, asserts that they scared up a flock of 11 deer early yesterday morning, which took flight in all directions, causing the two men to shoot quickly and promiscuously. It is understood that Dan finally became so excited that he threw down his gun, drew his trusted fountain pen and unsuccessfully charged after the covey of scared bucks. Much interest is being manifested by local hunters in the matter of who captures the largest deer, mile-tails excepted, killed between Sept. 10th and 20th, the first 10 days of the season, and by so doing will win the silver cup trophy offered by the Young Hardware store.

NO HUNTING ALLOWED WITHOUT PERMISSION

Local hunters are warned there is a section in the game laws of Oregon prohibiting hunting on land owned by others without first gaining permission. It reads: Section 31. No person shall hunt with a dog or gun upon the cultivated or inclosed land, or the occupied uncultivated land of another without first obtaining permission from the owner, occupant or agent thereof. No prosecution shall be commenced under this section except upon complaint of owner or agent of such cultivated or inclosed land.

Where the lands are referred to as "inclosed," the boundaries may be indicated by wire, ditch, hedge, fence, water or by any visible or distinctive lines that indicate a separation from the surroundings or contiguous territory.
