BEND, Ore., Sept. 12.—Five thousand spring lambs were shipped out of Bend today to winter feeding grounds in Idaho. The shipment is the first from Bend this fall. The lambs which belonged to Tom Connolly of Maupia, were brought in from the summer range in the Cascade national forest.

Delivery on 15,000 lambs which is expected to practically clean up feeding lambs from the central Oregon country, will start September 15 from Bend. These lambs will be trailed in from the Silver Lake district and The Dalles-California highway south of Bend is expected to be dotted with these flocks for the next thirty days.

2 ADDITIONAL 1ST GRADE ROOMS ARE AUTHORIZED

At a meeting last evening the school board authorized the opening of an additional first grade room in both the Roosevelt and Jackson schools. At the Roosevelt, 60 pupils are crowded into one room, while there are 47 in the first grade at the Jackson school, with others on the "waiting list" in each case, who, for the time being had to be turned back but who will be permitted to enter school as soon as they can be housed.

The sixth grade at the Jackson school is also so large that it had to be divided. According to Superintendent Hedrick, four additional rooms have had to be opened and teachers for them employed in order to care for the elementary school population. This increase in school facilities and teaching force caused by such an increase in population places a severe strain on the budget, but the board felt that the district's obligation to the school children must be met, even though the expenditure necessitated is greater than contemplated.

F. Wilson Waite has been engaged to conduct the high school band. He will meet with it for instruction three times a week in the high school auditorium at 4 P. M. High school credit will be given for the work, satisfactorily done and certified by Mr. Waite. The privilege of taking work in the band is also extended to any grade pupil. Such pupils who desire to join the band are asked to apply to Mr. Waite or Superintendent Hedrick.
