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BANK SWINDLER FACES ARREST ON LEAVING PRISON

Federal authorities will seek the arrest of Charles E. Havener, alleged bank swindler, when he leaves the Leavenworth penitentiary, where he is serving a six year term for defrauding the Union National bank of Beloit, Kan., of \$24,000.

A story published September 10 stated that Havener was serving the sentence for wrecking the First National bank of Beloit, Kan. The Union National bank of Beloit, was wrecked through Havener's activities and the First National bank of Beloit has never had any dealings with Havener.

Roy E. Nelson, postoffice inspector, announced that an indictment, charging a scheme to defraud five middle-western banks and a number of bank investors of the region out of \$500,000, had been returned by the federal grand jury here against Havener, and that he would be arrested upon leaving the prison.
