

GOOD APPLE CROP IN EAST, PRICES FAIRLY STRONG

CHICAGO, Sept. 16.—(A. P.) Good prospects for late apples are reported today by the United States bureau of agricultural economics.

The apple situation is rounding off with a few new turns, the report says. Winter kinds, especially Baldwin, make the best showing and will comprise a larger share of the crop than last year. The south, which is usually strong on York Imperials, has a small crop this year.

Important gains have been made of late in Michigan, Illinois and California apple orchards, but eastern states and the Pacific northwest expect fewer apples than were looked for during August. The Ozark apple section reports show that the fruit was hard hit by the heat wave in early September.

Medium to large extra fancy Jonathans, Winesaps and delicious are selling respectively at \$1.35 and \$1.75 and \$2.25 in the Wenatchee district of Washington.

Apple shipments from the west have gained only slightly, but the eastern and mid-western apple movement has increased fifty per cent. So far this season, Virginia, New York and Washington have each forwarded more than 500 carloads of apples.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—(A. P.) World's series preparations in Pittsburgh went steadily forward today despite the slicing of the Pirates' advantage to six games over the Giants and the menace of other eastern teams now making their last swing through the west.

McKechnie's club opened with a blast of hits against the Robins yesterday to balance their slump of last week, only to be denied a victory by rain. The Pirates had piled up a six to nothing lead.

Meanwhile the Giants elipped half a game from the margin of the National league leaders allowing five hits. Ken Greenfield gave the Reds but a single run while the Giants were gathering five tallies off Epha Rixey.

A big demand for world's series tickets developed when they were put on sale in Pittsburgh. Hotels are flooded with reservations.

The outlook of the leading Washington Senators in the American league continues favorable.

Yesterday the champions balanced a Philadelphia triumph over the receding White Sox by noosing out the Tigers, 5 to 3.

Sam Gray held Chicago to five hits while Holt and Dykes were pounding out a 4 to 2 victory for the Mackmen. Zachary, equally as effective against Cobb's entry, topped off his good twirling by pounding out a home run.

"Gooner" Goslin did likewise. The defeats of Detroit and Chicago enabled the St. Louis Browns to tighten their hold on third place in the American by shading the Red Sox with a two run ninth inning rally.

Ehmke held the Browns hitless until the seventh and was not scored upon until the final frame. Gaston likewise blanked the Sox until the closing canto when Carlyle scored the only Boston counter.

The St. Louis Nationals, however, lost ground to the Robins in the fourth place fight of the senior league by tossing off a game to the Phillies, 4 to 2.
