CAILLAUX SAILS FOR AMERICA TO SETTLE WAR DEBT

PARIS, Sept. 16.—(A. P.)—Finance Minister Caillaux left for the United States on his debt funding mission this afternoon. He took the boat train for Havre at 3:35 p. m. Simultaneous with his departure, it was declared in authoritative quarters that Premier Painleve and his cabinet were determined to stand or fall on the result of the Washington negotiations. They were quite conscious of that hazard, it was stated, when they started yesterday to give M. Caillaux full powers to negotiate. The present French government may be said to have been erected upon a tripod—Painleve, Briand and Caillaux—and if one leg gives way, the whole structure will collapse.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 16.—(A. P.)—France's war debt to the United States must be settled without any reference whatever to the terms of agreement that nation may have reached with Great Britain, it was asserted today by Senator Smoot, republican, Utah, a member of the American debt commission. The Utah senator's position, made known in a formal statement, was issued coincidentally with a visit to the White House by Chairman Borah of the senate foreign relations committee, who protested against more lenient terms for France than were given Great Britain by the United States. Senator Smoot issued his statement on arriving here to attend the meeting of the French and American funding bodies, while Senator Borah took the occasion of his first meeting in several months with President Coolidge to voice his views with the added remark that he would have something to say about the situation when congress reconvened.
