## ASHLAND CIVIC CLUB SESSION IS GREATLY ENJOYED

## DECLARES U. S. A. WILL JOIN WORLD COURT THIS YEAR

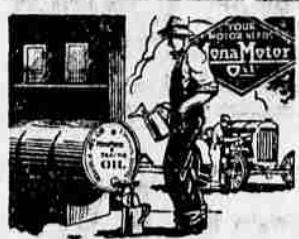
VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 16. — (A. P.)—The belief that Harding's dying wish for "the entrance of the United States into a world court," will be gratified, was expressed by United States Senator Frank B. Willis of Ohio, at the unveiling of the Harding International memorial here today.

The committee on foreign relations of the United States senate will, at the forthcoming session of congress, report in favor of entrance into the world court under the plan proposed by President Harding, Secretary Hughes and President Coolidge and the senate will, by a substantial and sufficient majority, ratify this action, Senator Willis said.

The monument, which was unveiled, was erected by the Kiwanis in Stanley park where the late president spoke while en route to Alaska in 1923.

Senator Willis represented the United States and Dr. H. J. King of Ottawa, minister of public works for Canada, representing the dominion in the services.

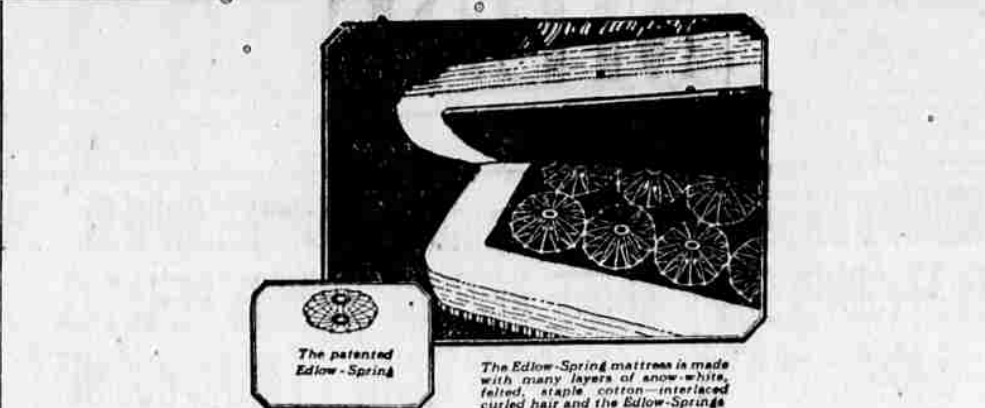
