Richards' victory completed the quarter finals and gave him the right to oppose William T. Tilden, the defending champion, in the semi-finals tomorrow.

Tilden advanced today by conquering a fellow-Philadelphian, Wallace F. Johnson, veteran chop stroke artist, in decisive fashion, 6-4, 6-0, 6-4.

The other semi-finalists will be William M. Johnston of San Francisco and R. Norris Williams of Philadelphia, both of whom have held the title twice before. Williams continued his sensational streak by defeating Howard Kinsey, 7-5, 6-4, 6-3, but Johnson was extended to beat Manuel Alonso, Spanish Davis cup ace, 6-3, 6-8, 6-4, 6-2.
